

HEART ATTACK FATAL TO O .T. Y. C. MEMBER.

Dr. William J. Graf, widely known Cincinnati physician, died of a heart attack March 27, 1955, in his automobile. Dr. Graf was a member of the Bethesda Hospital staff and had served as chief of staff there in 1945-47. A native Cincinnatian, he was graduated from the University of Cincinnati in 1906, and from the U C College of Medicine in 1910. He began his practice in 1912. Dr. Graf was a member of the American Medical Association, Ohio Medical Association, Cincinnati Academy of Medicine, Cincinnati Obstetrical Society and Nu Sigma Nu medical fraternity.

Surviving Dr. Graf are his w.dow, Mrs. Christine Porter Graf; two sons, Dr. William R. Graf and Dr. Douglas P. Graf; a daughter, Mrs. Janet Reld Tate, and seven grandchildren.

His friends at Omena will miss him as he and his family have for many years spent summer vacations at their cottage on Ingalls Bay.

PENGUIN CHATTER.
