

MEMBER PRESENTED TO QUEEN.

Perhaps you would be interested in a copy of a part of my sister Helen's last letter to us describing some of her activities including her presentation to the Royal House of the Netherlands. The letter is dated Jan. 24, 1957:

"And that was the day we were introduced to the Queen! It was a most interesting occasion and Bob and I were quite thrilled to be included. Several couples from each Diplomatic Corps were introduced by their various Ambassadors. It was a New Year's reception which the Queen gave at her palace in Amsterdam.

Bob got all dressed up in full dress, — tails and white tie. And I bought a new dress and hat. The dress was a brocade, — cream, pink, lavender, with a gold thread. The hat was an orchid lavender which blended in well with the dress. And I already had lavender gloves and costume jewelry. We couldn't wear black. And we had to have sleeves in our dresses and not too low a neck line.

An Embassy car called for us at 10:30 A. M., and Dignitaries went in the front entrance. But we and the others to be introduced went in the rear entrance. However, it was an impressive arrival. The servants were all in livery,—knee breeches and white stockings. The entrances were all roped off and guarded by colorful guards. There were crowds of people watching the arrivals. This was the first time I ever had been on the other side of the ropes!

Each group waited with their Ambassadors in the huge ball room which was beautiful, for the time to be introduced. It was a wonderful sight. All the men were in full dress. The military uniforms were most elaborate. There was the Minister from Pakistan with his beautiful silver lame turban and black beard. There were the Indian men with their knee length black coats and white leggins and peaked hats. With these were the wives draped in the lovely Saris which they wear. Then there were the Chinese women and the Japanese, all in their native costumes.

Ours was the fourth group to be presented. We entered a huge drawing room

where Queen Juliana and her Consort-Prince Bernhardt received us. Ambassador Mathews introduced each couple.

'Mr. and Mrs. Robert Reed. Mr. Reed is the Agricultural Attache'. Then I stepped up and the Queen shook hands with me and said:

'How do you do, Mrs. Reed. A Happy New Year to you'. I had my piece all ready:

'And a happy one to you, Your Majesty'. Then I shook hands with Prince Bernhardt, who said:

'Best wishes'. And I replied:

'Thank you your Royal Highness'. And that was that!

We were then ushered into another room where we were served bouillon and and cakes. In ten minutes we followed our Mission officer down to the great hall to await our cars which took us home again. It was very short, but I got quite a thrill out of it.

The Saturday before that, I sneaked out against doctor's orders so that Bob and I could go to a Dutch wedding. It was a civil service. But the bride was lovely in her bridal dress with her beautiful bouquet. It reminded me a little of the Friends ceremony.

I have been put on a committee of a Dutch Charity, and am trying to sell tickets to the people I know best in the Embassy . . . ".
