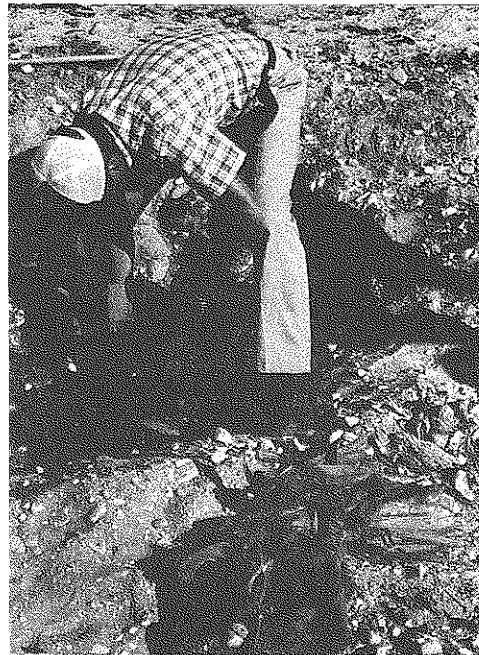

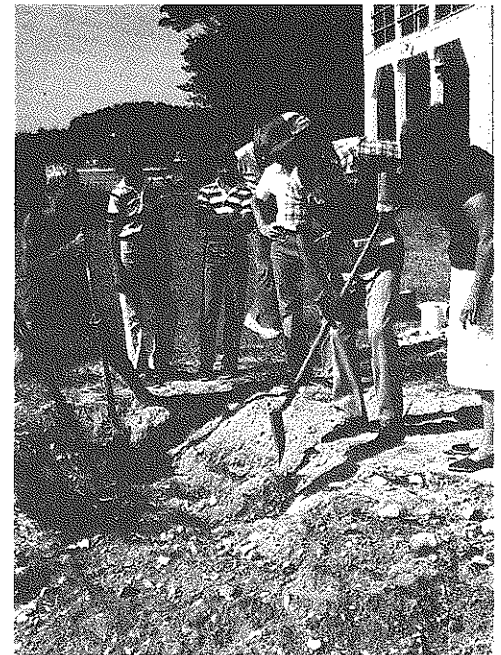

In Memoriam

ROBERT L. MORSE

One of our past Commodores, Robert L. Morse, died early this summer at his home in Shaker Heights, Ohio. An Ingalls Bay summer resident for over forty years, Commodore Morse will be missed by the summer community.

A native of Phoenix, Arizona, Bob Morse moved to Keweenaw, Illinois in 1900. In 1916 he entered the University of Illinois, but left the next year to join the Army, where he served with the 23rd Engineers Corps, where he was a motorcycle dispatch rider in Argonne, France. After he was discharged, he resumed his studies at the University of Michigan where he was graduated in 1921, earning a degree in automotive engineering.

Moving to Cleveland, Bob Morse spent four years at White Motor Co., then purchased a small business known as Truck Engineering Corp. After the depression the firm grew into a manufacturer of truck trailers. The firm continued to expand during World War II and was awarded a prestigious Army-Navy award for its production efforts. Later the firm developed patents which led to a type of dump trailer than revolutionized the industry. Mr. Morse retired in 1958.

He is survived by his wife Margaret, a daughter, Jane Saxton, a son, Thomas Morse, a brother, Sidney Morse, and several grandchildren.



VILMOS R. MISANGYI

Vilmos R. (Bill) Misangyi, OTYC treasurer and member of the OTYC Board of Directors, left this world on August 13, 1981, leaving behind his wife Chris, four children and seven grandchildren.

Bill was born in 1914 in Budapest, Hungary, first son of Dr. and Mrs. Vilmos Misangyi. After high school he attended the University of Budapest, receiving his Master's degree in Mechanical Engineering. He then entered the military academy and was an officer on the General staff of the Royal Hungarian Army during World War II. When Hungary was taken over by the Communists, he found himself alone, without a home country, in Austria. From there he emigrated in 1951 to the United States where he became a citizen. Living in West Bloomfield, Michigan, he worked for the Ford Motor Company, retiring as manager of the Design-Analysis department in 1976.

During his working years he developed a Basic Science kit for middle school level children. The kit included a textbook and do-it-yourself laboratory experiments; it is still used in American schools.

After spending several months in Hawaii, Bill and Chris came to Omena in February of 1977 to begin construction of their new home on the Bay. It was Bill's daily enjoyment to watch the building process until it was completed and they could occupy their home in October of 1977.

Bill was an active person with many ideas and much enthusiasm who will be missed by everyone. His kindness, warmth and love will be with us always.

MARGARET JANE JACKSON

Word has been received of the death of Margaret Jane Jackson, one of our former summer residents and Omena- Traverse Yacht Club members. She died August 17, 1981 in Leesburg, Florida.

Jane Jackson was a graduate of the University of Michigan and a native of Ann Arbor. She was a retired school teacher, a member of First Church of Christ, Scientist, Leesburg, the Tri Delta Sorority and Pi Lambda Theta National Honorary Education Society.

Jane and Humphrey Jackson, one of our Past Commodores, moved to Leesburg, Florida two years ago from Winter Park.

She is survived by her husband, son, David S. Jackson of Plant City, eight grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Christmas in Omena is unmatched for winter beauty, hospitality and traditional celebration—Come back and see.

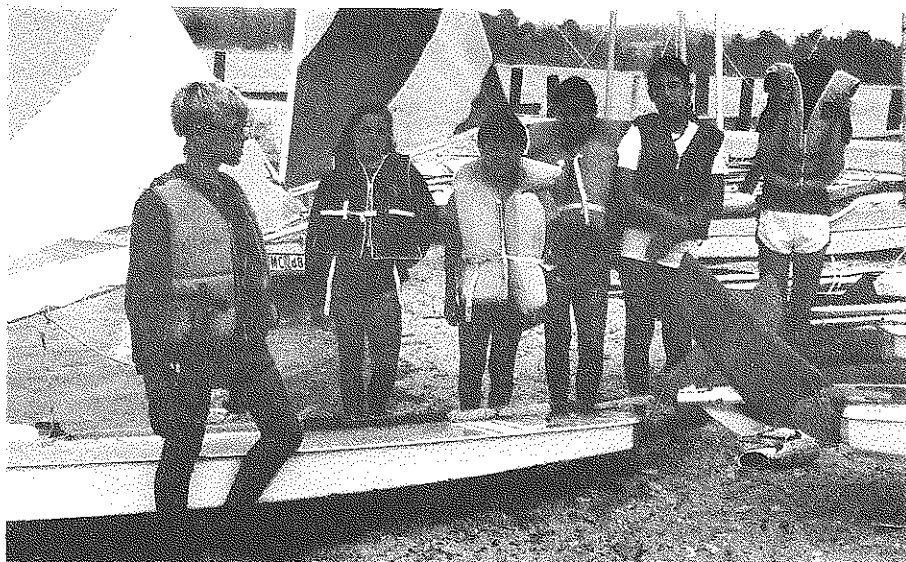

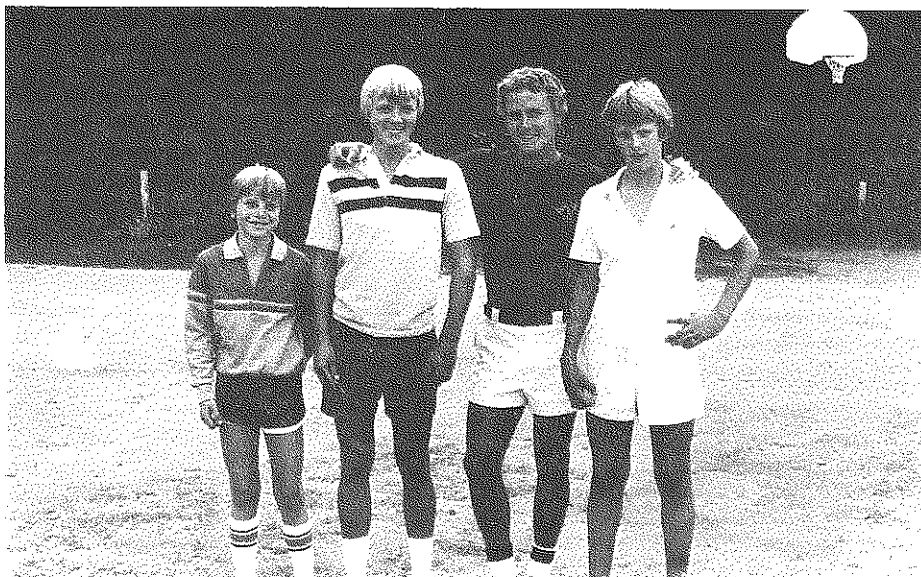

The Secretary read the minutes of the July 9, 1980 membership meeting, and the minutes were approved as read.

D.J. St. John was introduced as a new director replacing Mary Woolford who resigned because of her limited time in Omena this year.

Bill Misangyi was very ill so his report was given by D.J. St. John. There is Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) in the Club account and One Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$1,800.00) owed in outstanding dues.

Commodore Mulligan thanked all the members who helped to open and maintain the club since last fall.

Social/Entertainment Committee Chairperson, Elizabeth Keye reported that her committee had a fabulous beginning with a lovely reception for the 16 past Commodores and a catered dinner for 140 persons to open the 1981 O.T.Y.C. summer season. She reported many new

events are planned for this summer: a Dinner Dance with Buffet, a Pig Roast, a Woolford Mad Hatter Night and special Food Sales. She will be looking forward to seeing everyone at the weekly Wednesday Pot Lucks.

Waterfront Committee Chairperson is Bob Bailey. It was reported that the dock survived the winter very nicely with only a normal amount of maintenance needed for repairs. There were no major problems this year. The improvement of the south beach and the boat ramp will be deferred until next summer.

House and Grounds Co-Chairpersons, Bob and Trudy Lewis were unable to be present so Vernon Keye gave their report. The hedge next to the clubhouse was moved out three feet to protect it from the drip off the roof. The men's bathroom is being painted and redecorated. A new screen door has been installed, a new large metal cabinet assembled, a front window replaced due to a break-in, a new water heater installed and the completion of framing and hanging of all the Commodore pictures. This fall a new roof will be installed and adequate ventilation provided. This summer a survey of the odd lot leading to Omena Lake will be completed.

YOUTH AND ADULT ACTIVITIES

Tennis Committee Chairperson, Jonnie Hodgson reported that Flip Goodspeed has returned for his third year as the Tennis Instructor at O.T.Y.C. The July Tournament has 17 members enrolled and group lessons have started out with great enthusiasm. Each Friday from 1:00 to 3:00 there will be a Round Robin mixed-doubles fun tournament. All levels of tennis are encouraged to come and play. The Pig Roast will be the Tennis Committee's fund raiser.

Sailing Committee Chairperson, Stu Mulligan reported that Garry Winter is our new sailing instructor for the summer. The enrollment for our program is down this summer. Stu's committee has races planned on Thursday and Sunday, a George Smith Regatta and a Moonlight Regatta on August 12th. It was discussed and decided to have a special meeting tomorrow morning with the parents and children to decide about the eligibility of children racing against other clubs.

Special Events Chairperson, Holly Smith was unable to attend so Suzie Mulligan told everyone of the many events planned for children and adults on Wednesday. -- Rump Bumping trip, a canoe trip, the sand dunes, a sailing overnight and a Manitou Island campout.

Breeze Chairperson, Rat Renz described the joint effort put forth by everyone in putting out the fall and spring BREEZE. She will be happy to send the BREEZE to other persons if you will just send her their addresses and \$4.00 for each new subscription.

Membership Committee Chairperson, Joan Roth reported that her committee nominates Kathy Bosco, Caroline Oberndorf and William Renz as Directors for the September 15, 1981 to September 15, 1984 term. The motion was seconded and unanimously passed.

NEW BUSINESS

Mrs. Mulligan read the proposed By-Law Amendment, Article VIII, which will read, "No member over the age of 65 shall be liable for payment of any special assessment". There was a great deal of discussion to clarify the reasoning for this Amendment. Marian Finn moved we accept this proposal, Mary Pratt seconded and the motion was passed.

Mrs. Mulligan then read the second proposal which is a replacement language for Article XIII regarding Guest Privileges; it will read "A friend or family member of a member of the Club may be granted Club privileges by the Board of Directors upon written application to the Board by the host member". Mrs. Mulligan then explained that by stating this we are deleting the 30 day application by the host member which is unreasonable. There was discussion for limiting the Guest Memberships to two (2) years, not necessarily consecutive. Stu Mulligan moved we add this to the proposal, Jonnie Hodgson seconded. The original motion, as amended, was then voted on and passed.

The proposed Amendment to the Articles of Incorporation of O.T.Y.C. was read by Mrs. Mulligan. It states the purpose of our Club as: "It shall be the purpose of the Omena Traverse Yacht Club to provide social, educational, and recreational opportunities, including various aspects of boating activities, to members of all ages, in an environment of friendship and goodwill". The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.
