

In Memoriam Mary F. Foltz

Mary F. Foltz, a long time resident of Omena, died Saturday, the 8th of May, 1982, at Leelanau Memorial Hospital. She was 81.

Born in Chicago on August 1, 1900, she was the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Frederick C. Schaefer. In 1936 she married Benjamin Foltz, who preceded her in death in 1974. She was also preceded in death by two sisters, Doris and Hortense Schaefer and her brother Frederick Schaefer.

She was a member of the Suttons Bay Congregational Church, the Zonta Club of Traverse City, the Omena Women's Club, the Leelanau County Historical Society, the Friendly Garden Club of Traverse City and was a former member of the Michigan State Indian Commission.

Mary was a founder and charter member and instrumental in the launching of the Omena-Traverse Yacht Club. She contributed her labors and many talents to the benefit of the Club through her years on the House Committee. Among her major projects were the remodeling and redecorating of the snack bar, new stage curtains and the beautiful wheel chandeliers for the dining room lighting. She had also been an ardent sailor of her "Lightning" and she and her brother, Frederick had participated in the races of that Gass.

Through her knowledge and distinctive architectural ability many of this area's residents are living in beautiful homes of her design. Her efforts and contributions to the Civic betterment are known throughout Leelanau County.

She is survived by a niece, Mrs. Ward (Marianne) Donahue, of Naperville, Ill. Private graveside services were held May 12th at the Omena Hillcrest Cemetery.

She will be remembered and missed by her many friends.




