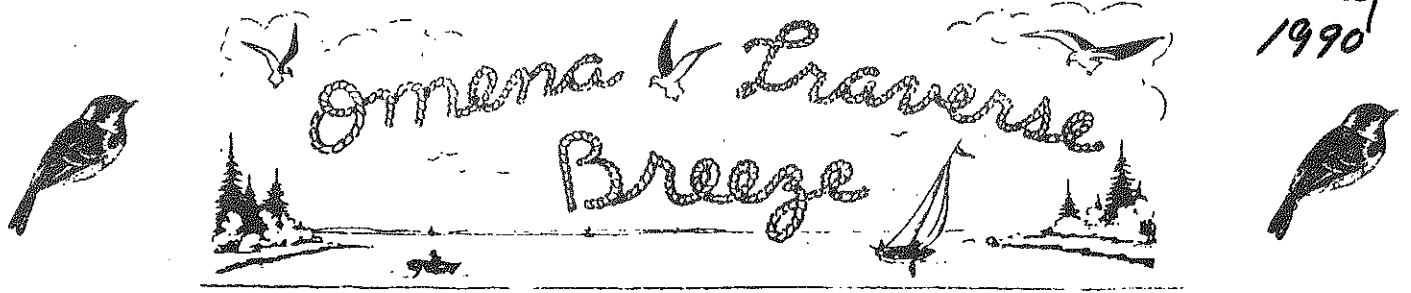

In Memorium

Frances Dyer Lyon

From *The Cincinnati Enquirer*
December, 1989

Frances Dyer Lyon, who had been active for years in the Charter Committee, died Sunday at the Marjorie P. Lee Home in Hyde Park.

Mrs. Lyon, 87, served as secretary on the Charter Committee's board of directors in the 1950s and 1960s.

"I would call her a quiet, steady and thoughtful influence," said Bill Hamilton, former executive director of Charter. "She made herself a real student of civic affairs, and it showed."

The Charter Committee is a local party that was created in the early part of this century to fight the corrupt political-boss system that ruled city government.

"She epitomized the ideals of Charter," said Cincinnati Councilwoman Bobbie Sterne, a Charterite. "She was a staunch worker and a delightful woman."

A member of the first graduating class at Withrow High School, Mrs. Lyon attended the University of Cincinnati.

She taught social studies at Walnut Hills High School from 1924 to 1934.

She also was a member of the College Club of Cincinnati and the Cincinnati Woman's Club, of which she also was a board member and corresponding secretary in 1955 and 1956.

Mrs. Lyon's daughter, Margaret Lyon of Cincinnati, said her mother balanced her civic interests with her devotion to her family. Her husband was the late Dr. Robert A. Lyon, professor of pediatrics at the University of Cincinnati Medical School.

She also is survived by another daughter, Elizabeth Ehrhardt of St. Louis, Mo.; a son, Edmund Lyon of Lexington, Ky.; and three grandchildren.

This past year it was my good fortune to visit my friend Ross V. Crowell in Chili. He was in charge of the American School there. We visited the Hotel Miramar at Vina del Mar on the Pacific Ocean.

The American School is located in the side of a mountain and has a 160 acre campus.

After spending a week there, we visited Buenos Aires and Rio de Janeiro.

We stayed at the Marona Palace Hotel in Rio and took the aerial car up Sugar Loaf and the Christ the Redeemer by train.

The statue is 38 meters in height and the mountain on which it stands is 710 meters high. The view of Rio from here is spectacular.

Just thought you'd be interested to know how your past Commodores are getting along.

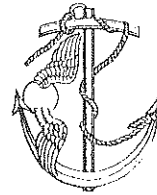

Treasurer's Report

Dear Commodore:

As you can see from the attached balance sheet our receipts in 1989 were less than our expenditures.

The major reason for the deficit was the clubhouse maintenance, i.e., the painting of the clubhouse and the installation of the kitchen door ramp. The other line items of interest are the expenses and receipts in connection with our social events. Our potlucks went a little into the hole but that has also been the case in previous years. We lost money on our dinners and particularly our Commodore's reception even though we had an excellent dinner and program. A greater attendance would have helped. On the positive side, our fund raisers did much better than in past years and hopefully we can have another successful fish boil this year. We also seemed to have been doing well on our sales items.

In connection with this years' budget please bear in mind that we already have had a major expense of \$6,219.50 for the dock repair which was completed late last year but paid for this year. Actually we had allocated \$7,575.00 for the project and thus came out somewhat better than we had expected. However, we had to cash the smaller of our certificates of deposit to pay for the dock repair.

In all other respects our receipts and expenditures were not out of line with previous years.

I am sorry to say that due to the lack of signatures we were unable to include membership cards in our billing, which all members should have received by now. We will try to have them available at the Clubhouse at the beginning of the season.
