





HISTORIC NOTES

The following advertisement for Omena Inn circa 1905 was found by Marsha Buehler when they moved into their cottage on Omena Bay.

This is a summer resort where one may really get complete rest, in quiet or in a dozen diversions; and in these diversions enjoy the company of cultured people. It is neither ultra nor expensive, and yet in the neighborhood of other resorts which are so - Harbor Point, Charleviox, and Mackinac. It is a spot where one can do much or little; where the dinner jacket and the sack coat, the silk gown and the dimity mix at the hops; and where vaudeville and fishing are not less in favor than bridge and driving. Omena is on the wooded neck of land, on the west shore of Grand Traverse Bay and has many beautiful natural walks and loitering places. The protection given the harbor makes it a safe place for children to boat. The climate is equable, the days being warm and the nights cool. Somewhat heavier clothes than those worn south are desirable. The Inn or Club House is simple and yet entirely sanitary, due regard being given to bath and other toilet conveniences. The table offers the same home cooking through which Mr. Dewey brought the first distinction to the Harbor Point Club House when in charge of it several years ago. Omena usually summers competent physicians, and has telegraphic connections with all parts of the country. The stores of the village contain a rather complete supply of staple dry goods and food stuffs, basket ware and other articles suitable for souvenirs. Indians and Armenians also interest guests with their wares. Hayracks, launches, sail boats, carry-alls, buggies, and the bowling alley may be engaged upon reasonable terms. Row boats and tennis courts are at one's

disposal. Cottagers are very courteous to guests of the Inn, and all come together in the evenings and at dinner as one large family. The Inn has its own music and assists in all entertainments. Its rates are from \$2.00 to \$3.00 a day and from \$10.50 to \$15.00 a week, depending of course upon the accommodations afforded, and the part of the season, July and August being the most popular. Special inducements are made by the Inn in June and September. In the latter month the transportation lines give half rate excursions, and fishing is then at its best. Omena is reached directly by the Northern Michigan Transportation Line and the Grand Rapids & Indiana Railway, and by rail and boat connections with the Manitou Line at Northport and with the Pere Marquette Railroad at Traverse City. Buses at Traverse City, Northport and Omena meet all trains and boats.

OMENA INN W.H. DEWEY, Proprietor OMENA, MICHIGAN WALDO ABBOT sent this article from the May, 1956 *Breeze*. WALDO remembers Ray Flett very well. "He was a grand fellow - always ready to do whatever had to be done."
