


Accordingly, your nominating committee will offer the following resolutions for adoption at the Annual Meeting of members in July, 1994:







Omena via the InterNet

There is and will never be a good substitute for actually being in Omena, but now anyone with an interest in Omena and who has access to electronic mail can communicate with others via the Omena Email List. First off, it is free, and will stay that way. Those of us already on the list envision its purpose in varying ways, but in general it is intended to build community by the exchange of information, stories, news, envy of recent vacations, etc.... Here are a few questions I often get about the list:

How does it work?

Imagine a very dedicated person (but in the case a computer program) named "Omena". Omena keeps a log of people who have joined the "list". If I then send an email message to Omena, it dutifully makes a copy of my message and sends it to everyone on the log saving me that effort. More importantly, if someone who receives that message then executes a "reply" from her/his computer the message will go to Omena and not just the person who initiated the message. Omena then again dutifully sends a copy of that reply to everyone on the list. In practice it is a little like talking in a room full of people where everyone can hear and be heard by everyone else.

How do I get email access?

There are many ways to do this. Some people have InterNet or bitnet access through their work place. If this is not the case for you, some popular services are Compuserve Information Services and America On Line. They both have 800 numbers and run in the neighborhood of \$8-\$9 a month at the time of this writing. The large services have the advantages of having local phone numbers in most major cities (including Traverse City) so your only real charge is the monthly fee.

How do I join the list or get more information?

NO-COOK SPICED CHERRY FREEZER JAM (courtesy of Mary Smith)

2 cans (16 ounces each) tart cherries

4 cups granulated sugar

1 pouch (3 ounces) liquid fruit pectin

1/4 cup lemon juice

1/2 teaspoon almond extract

1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/8 teaspoon ground allspice

Dash ground cloves

1/2 teaspoon red food coloring (optional)

Rinse clean freezer-proof containers and lids with boiling water; drain well. Set aside. Drain cherries; discard liquid. In a large mixing bowl, mash cherries. Add the sugar; mix well. Set aside 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. In a small bowl, combine pectin, lemon juice, almond extract, cinnamon, allspice and




cloves; mix well. If desired, stir in red food coloring. Stir pectin mixture into cherry mixture; stir continuously for 3 minutes. Fill containers within 1/2-inch of tops. Wipe off top edges of containers; quickly cover with lids. Let stand at room temperature 24 hours, then place in freezer. After opening, store in refrigerator. Makes 5 cups of jam.
