

Schedule of Fees

Permanent Membership: Family Initiation Fee (includes children up to 24 years of age): \$250.00 Adult Annual Dues: (ages 24 or more as of January 1): \$65.00 (as voted by the Board in 1994) Junior Annual Dues: (ages 14 to 23 as of January 1): \$12.00

To attract sailing and tennis instructors we have raised the salary for these positions. Therefore, it has been necessary to raise the enrollment costs for the youth in the summer programs, The tuition for these programs has not been raised for more than ten years. The Board has increased the cost of each program by \$5 per week. For children of members the cost has increased from \$20 to \$30 per week for the two programs. For non-members the cost has changed from \$15 to \$20 for one program and from \$25 to \$35 for both sailing and tennis.

As in the past few years there will be a pre-season informal open house, Saturday, June 24th at 5:30 PM. Bring your own libation and hor d'oeuvres to share.

If you have any concerns, or any suggestion for improving our club please let me know. Barbara and I will be in Omena by the middle of June.

In ending this letter I would like to give thanks to all of you who have made the Club a special place. Also, a special thanks to Betsy Ehrhardt and Margy Lyon for their excellent work in producing the Breeze. Thanks!!





We hope everyone will enjoy seeing our boat bobbing in the water... we can't wait until June when we bring "Anelare" from Northport to Omena."



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

Upon their and the Cadillac's much heralded arrival, Blanche was immediately put in the hospital with pneumonia. It seems there were many air leaks around the doors, etc. and a non-working heater! - All four of our children drove the Cadillac constantly during their high school years. It's tank-like proportions gave us parents a feeling of their security and the knowledge of their whereabouts. About ten years ago Vin had it restored and now it's too "good" to use!?!"

JOE, CATE and JOHN VARLEY are enjoying their first year in Uganda. We have seen elephants, warthogs, giant forest hogs, incredible birdlife, hippos and crocodiles in game reserves, and so are heartened that the game is gradually returning after being hunted down during Uganda's 20 years of civil war.

on wet logs and tarzan bridges) to view chimps and other primate families recently "habituated" to humans. They watched us as much as we watched them.

The down side of life in this pretty country is the overwhelming presence of AIDS in everyday life. The "productive" adult segment of society is being decimated. Some villages have more than 50% child-headed households. There are many issues related to economic growth and the education and subsistence of the 2 million AIDS orphans which are difficult to address. Certainly it is very difficult to accept the constant deaths of adults in their 30s and 40s.

Joe has spent time in Rwanda, as the U.S.A.I.D. mission re-opened in the bombed-out, mortared building - helping to re-organize the staff who remained alive.

Maura will graduate from high school in Orinda, CA. where she has lived with Cate's sister's family this year. She, Cate and Anna will be in Omena by mid-June. John and Joe will arrive in early July, and everyone except Joe will stay through the summer, until time to take the girls to the University of Michigan. We very much

look forward to seeing everyone in Omena

We intend to boost the Omena economy in July with a reunion of our Guatemala Peace Corps group at our farm!

BETSY and DREW EHRHARDT and MARGY LYON visited Libby and Mike Mustaine in Orlando, FL the last week in March. They had a wonderful time with them and were able to see many of the tourist attractions. Margy, Betsy and Drew will be in Omena the last week in June.

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
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
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Wildflowers by Trudy Lewis

Mayflower (Hepatica)



This is one of the first Spring flowers. The flowers are lavender, pink or white. We have two kinds, one with pointed leaves and the other with rounded leaves. The rather thick leaves last all winter.




Spring-Beauty

This is also an early flower. The half inch blooms are pink with darker pink stripes. The tuberous roots were used as food by both the Indians and the early settlers. Fragrant.


Trillium

Trillium blooms from mid May to early June. It is first white but changes to pink as it ages. If you see a green flower it indicates that the plant has a disease. It has three leaves, three sepals and three petals. It takes several years to flower from seed, and is a tuberous plant.



Forget-Me-Not

Omena Point is famous for the beautiful blue forget-me-nots. I am told that they are escapees from Mrs. Bradley's garden. A biennial that easily reseeds, it is now on the east side of the point in any spot that gets spring sun. Some of them are white.



Herb Robert (Red Robin)

This is a smaller relative of wild-geranium. It blooms from early spring to October usually with one or two flowers in bloom at one time. It is bright pink and common in the woods.

Trout Lily (Adder's Tongue, Dog-toothed Violet)



This yellow flower is found in the woods before the trees leaf out. It grows from a corm and is usually found in colonies.



False Solomon's Seal (Spikenard)




This is a tall plant that bends toward the ground. It has small white flowers at the end of the plant stem. It is this plant that has mottled yellowish-white berries that later turn translucent red. Solomon's Seal (not pictured) is also in our area. It has similar leaves but the greenish-yellow bell shaped flowers droop in pairs from the leaf axils.

Wild Geranium




This plant is widespread in the woods of our area. It has pink flowers and lacy leaves. It is also called cranesbill for the shape of its seed. This is the seed that sticks to you and your animals when you walk through the late summer woods.

Dutchman's-Breeches



Another early spring woods flower is Dutchman's-breeches. It also grows from a corm. It is white, and has a fragrance.

Clintonia




This is a yellow to greenish flower with dark lustrous leaves. In late summer it has toxic blue berries.

Jack-In-The-Pulpit



Look in the woods near wet places for this plant, although it also grows in drier woods. Jack is an upright plant with two tripartite leaves. In late summer it has a cluster of red toxic seeds.

Wild Columbine



This plant blooms from late May into early summer. Look for it along the road near Firelane 6. It is red and yellow.

Meet Our New O.T.Y.C. Members


JOEY AND LARRY BENSLEY

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
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New Message Board


Omena Historical Society

NEW BOARD POLICIES

- 1. Since our membership has expanded and our potlucks have strained the safety and size of our facilities, the Board has been compelled to make some restrictions for the safety and welfare of our members. Therefore we adopted the following policy:
 - a Potluck dinners are limited to 160 people.
 - b Sign-up deadline is 10:00 a.m. of the Monday preceding the potluck. It is requested that hostesses wanting to bring more than seven guests wait until after the 10 a.m. Monday deadline, (but before noon) to check on availability. If room, register by calling the pot luck chairman. Hostesses canceling should notify potluck chairman.
 - c We regret that we can no longer accommodate large family gatherings at the potlucks and suggest use of the facilities on another night.
 - d It is requested that no hostess bring table service to be set before 3:00 p.m. on the day of the potluck, so that potluck chairmen have time to properly position tables and chairs to accommodate everyone.
- 2. Attention all Youth Program Participants: A serious problem of youthful vandalism occurred during the latter part of the 1994 Youth Program. In order to make sure that behavior of this type does not occur again, any disruptive youth program member will be required to have his or her parent in attendance with their child at all subsequent youth program activities.
- 3. The OTYC Board will not allow anyone to do any repairs, refurbishing, alteration, decoration or additions to the building or facilities without prior approval by the Board.
- 4. Any member of the OTYC who has questions about the

behavior or performance of any people hired by the OTYC must NEVER question, order, or criticize an employee directly. Any problems should be taken up with a Board member or the appropriate committee chairperson. All our employees are highly valued, competent workers whose continued presence is essential to the operation of the OTYC.
