
OFF TO A GOOD BEGINNING ...



Report from the Commodore



In my remarks at the Annual Meeting in July I indicated that we as a Board, and I as Commo-



dore, are thinking about the needs of the Club as we move into a new era - into our next 50 years and into the year 2000. We're currently evaluating the areas of program, which has already expanded to a five month social season, of membership which is rapidly increasing, and of the preservation and safety of the building we occupy.

We are still working on membership needs. Last year you, the members, pointed out some areas we needed to reevaluate. That has led to further study about our membership categories and how big we want to be. The study is continuing.

At the beginning of our season, in the interest of safety, the locks were removed from the two east doors (to the kitchen & storeroom). The long closed northeast door was opened and Mike Biskupski installed a wider deck outside and posted Exit signs.

I also announced we had established a new Preservation and Safety Committee, reporting to the Board. It is to begin an assessment of the major needs of the facility and especially the 87 year old building we occupy. Dan Schleef will chair the committee, which includes Larry Bensley, Gary Silverman, Ole Kiersey, plus Mike Biskupski, House & Grounds, as ex officio member. They all have backgrounds which particularly qualify them for this committee. Dan, Larry and Gary are permanent residents who can meet with contractors or oversee projects during the off season.

This committee is different from the Building & Grounds Committee which is charged with seasonal maintenance. They will look at major areas, the roof and its anticipated life, the wiring, the foundation, the structure, etc. Any major work planned to upgrade or repair would be under their supervision. They expect to establish some priorities and a schedule of anticipated repairs or replacements. Their first assignment, requested by the Board, is to assess the wiring. They will recommend to the Board, receive bids and oversee any repair or renovation work when it is scheduled.

This summer the Board also asked Bill Marbach and Vin Moore to serve as Historians. They have been consolidating and organizing our records and will begin preserving in archival materials those which are most vital. We purchased the first locked, fire-resistant, steel filing cabinet, which is housed in the lower storeroom.

The Board also established guidelines for the use of the building facility, especially for larger events such as weddings and private parties. These will be posted as well as included with any rental contracts.

Fees for rental use of the building were increased. Cleaning fees are now \$200. Sponsored non-member rental (available only by consent of the Board) is increased to \$500. Member rental remains at \$200.

At the Annual Meeting I announced the appointment of Jane Saxton as chairman of the 50th Anniversary Committee. You will hear more about plans and events in this and the next issue of the Breeze. C.M.

DOCK REPAIR COMPLETION

The Dock Repair Project was finally completed by Kal Excavating in September. The project was begun on September 16 and completed about October 1. According to the plan, steel was driven 18 feet down, the area felled with rock, and since the outer side of the crack area had been undermined over the last several years, a great deal of rock fill was used there. A yellow safety stripe was painted on the steel and new boards added to the dock where needed. The cost was the originally agreed-to \$19,540.

OTYC OPEN - Jack Bishop




Gregory Bills

SAFETY FIRST:

PERSONAL WATERCRAFT

A PWC (a.k.a. Jet Ski) is a power boat and must follow the same rules of the road as a runabout or large yacht. This includes observing swimming areas, no wake zones and other restrictions.


Laws in effect controlling the use of PWC's:

- *All people on or towed by a PWC must wear a wearable type PFD.
- *No operation between sunset and sunrise.
- *No wake jumping, weaving in heavy boat traffic, coming unreasonably close to other boats.
- *No carrying more people than the PWC was designed to carry.
- *Must observe the 100 feet rule as applies to all power boats, and not jump wakes closer than 150 feet from the boat making the wake.
- *Young people under 12 cannot operate.
- *Young people 12 to 16 need a boating safety certificate or direct adult supervision to operate.
- *Kill switch lanyard must be used if PWC has the system.
- *Person owning or in charge of PWC cannot allow young people to operate illegally.




