



CELEBRATING KIDS - Suzie Mulligan

Current member Marilyn Flett was a teenager when she and three friends persuaded Hector Carmichael to rent his "Pavilion" to them for use as a yacht club. (The initial cost: \$1.00 per year.) Mary Helen Ayars (Ray), Carolin "Rat" Smith (Renz), Betsy Lyon (Ehrhardt) and Margy Lyon were among the youngsters who took on many small but important tasks: signing up people for potlucks, making stage curtains, managing the snack bar, etc.

Both teenagers and adults manned the boats in the first Lightning fleet, and a fleet of Penguin sailboats was soon formed to suit the abilities of younger members. As sailing activities increased, a more organized Youth Program evolved to include tennis and sailing lessons, and sometimes swimming and boating safety.



SAILBOAT RACING - Dennis Turner

The OTYC Sunfish Regatta was held on July 26. Unlike last year, the wind cooperated, so two races were held. Using his uncanny ability to anticipate every windshift, John Ray won both races and overwhelmed the competition. There was a tie for 2nd place between the Caroline Turner/Alison Biskupski boat and the boat skippered by Bili Mason and crewed by Suzanne Mason.

As is typical for these OTYC races, however, the most interesting stories are not connected with the leaders, but with the also-sailed. The team of Kathy Turner and Marcia Biskupski, for example, would have completed the course except for mutiny at the leeward buoy. Marcia told her captain, "If you gybe around that buoy, I will never speak to you again!" Weighing the alternatives, Kathy chose not to round the mark before heading for the finish line. One could only speculate what the response would have been if Mike B. had been the skipper.

The True Grit Award, however, must go to Austin Jones. The first OTYC Sunfish he chose was defectively rigged and, for a few harrowing minutes, the boat gybed left and right before dumping Austin in the bay. The boat could not be righted, so Mike Biskupski graciously belly-flopped into the water and swarm the boat back to shore. Soaking wet himself, Austin returned to shore in the Committee boat, rigged a different Sunfish, and still managed to finish the race ahead of a couple of competitors.

On August 2, the Regatta for Big Boats took place. John Harris and his boat, "Sure", did not enter this year, thus raising the hopes of the other entrants.

The course was from the OTYC dock to the Stoney Point Buoy and back. The wind varied from strong to non-existent and blew from all points of the compass except the east and southeast. One could literally be close-hauled on starboard tack with a SW wind on the Stoney Point leg and then, after rounding the buoy still be close-hauled on starboard back to Omena, because the wind changed from SW to NE in a matter of minutes.

The race for 3rd place was exciting, with the Sandt, Mulligan and Martineau boats all bunched together within a hundred yards of the finish line. With the OTYC dock looming up, both Bill Sandt and Stu Mulligan chose discretion and tacked just before the finish line. Bob and Connie did not tack, closed their eyes, crossed their fingers, and just squeezed by the dock, moving from 5th to 3rd place in the last hundred feet. Second place went to Bill and Judy Knorp's boat, with Caroline Turner as helmswoman. In first place was the Turner boat, with Dennis at the helm, crewed by Michael Turner and Mark Spooner.

PRESERVATION & SAFETY COMMITTEE REPORT

This committee was formed at the end of the 1997 season to develop a long-range plan for the maintenance and improvement of OTYC, including all its facilities. Meetings during spring, 1998, led to two major areas of effort: the determination of the present status of the physical facilities and the development of a procedure for determining future needs.

The first area, as reported to the OTYC Board and to the Annual Meeting, included the following steps:

- 1. A general inspection of the building, with particular attention given to fire safety, as well as to the condition of the building. This inspection revealed some important, though relatively minor deficiencies which have been remedied at minimal cost.
- 2. Testing of the water supply to the building with satisfactory results.
- 3. An inspection of the electrical wiring and fixtures. The report from this inspection has now been received, and it indicates some problems which require attention. The report is being sent to the Board for further action. Secondly, the Committee has implemented the following plan for involving members in the determination of future requirements to provide a pleasant and safe facility for members and their children.

- 1. General maintenance of building and grounds
- 2. Maintenance and improvement of waterfront facilities
- 3. Improvement of kitchen facilities
- 4. Maintenance and improvement of tennis facilities
- 5. Improvement of facilities for children and teenagers.

Key individuals were identified for each of these areas, and charged with consulting others with particular interest in that area, to develop a description of needs which would be of importance over the next several years. Following the gathering of these reports and consolidation of their content, a questionnaire will be prepared which is is the Committee's plan to distribute to the full membership for comments and further suggestions.

With this information in hand, the Committee will provide a timetable of recommendations for the future maintenance and improvement of the Club facilities for consideration by the Board and by the membership.

Doris. Don worked as an engineer for Ford Motor Co. for many years and was most proud to be a part of the large automobile industry.


Don was a rather quiet man, one who was always there for everyone. He especially liked to travel, and he and Doris had been all over the world.



THE STATE OF THE CLUB Report (presented by our retiring Commodore at the 1998 Annual Meeting)

Want to report to you today that this club is a FISCALLY RESPONSIBLE organization with a VITAL, VIBRANT membership, occupying an HISTORIC OLD BUILDING with extreme pride and a RENEWED SENSE of responsibility for the future of the Club and its magnificent facilities.

We all know about our past history. We have a new book about it for sale this year. But I want to talk about the last few years.

About six years ago the Board had a wake up call...to the tune of a costly renovation on the front porch that caught everyone by surprise. Since then the Board has grappled with the reality of the aging building and its problems: escalating taxes; a growing membership; many requests for use of the building by members, their relatives and friends and several local non-profit groups. The Board has responded by raising initiation fees, the level of fees for the Youth program, dock slip rental and for rental of the building, and brought our insurance up to a more adequate level. When we were faced with the major expense of the dock repair you, the membership, responded when we asked for more money for dues and for special assessments. At that time the Board also began the fund to set aside money for future renovations, pledging to save \$25 per member per year for that purpose.

With that fund now in place, the Board set up the new Preservation and Safety Committee, whose first report you will soon hear. (See page 6.)

In program areas we have also expanded. The Youth group now includes kids who are visiting grandparents and families for one or two weeks, as well as longer term summer residents. The social programs increased to several off-season events: Labor Day picnic, October apple picking and cocktail party, midwinter ski outing and the Memorial Day cocktail party, as well as several additional summer events with out-of-Omena trips...all in addition to our regular potlucks and dinners.

In the last few years the Board itself has become more actively involved in the details of running the Club. It is a widely representative and committed group.

When I first began my term as Commodore, an "Older Commodore" talked to me about his concerns for the Club, pointing out that there had always been a mingling of generations with a respect for each other among older and younger people that was the strength of this Club. He was concerned that, in this contemporary world, that would not survive here. As witnessed by the activities all around us this year, it is evident that it is still happening in this unique place.

We are 50 years old and having a party to celebrate it. Many of us may not be here for the 100th celebration but, at the rate we're going, I'm sure there will be one.
