

It was love at first sight when Mary met Bob Woolford in the pathology lab at Ohio State University. She was a student nurse, and he was a medical student. This meeting was a big turning point in Mary's life....goodbye to those tom boy days of youth growing up in Columbus, Ohio, and hello to love and romance.

"I will never forget our first date. Bob asked me to one of the weekly dances at the Olentangy River Amusement Park where Johnny Long's band was playing. After we danced to the *One Night Stand*, Bob whispered into my ear.... "if you are this great at dancing, I know you can do the other thing well"."

But it wasn't all that easy for Mary "to do the other thing".....first, she had to chase Bob east to Harvard University. With pride that her mission was successful, she beamed, "I was able to beat out all those Vassar girls for Bob's heart. He asked me to marry him, and our wedding was September 1, 1940."

Bob and Mary were introduced to Leelanau County in the 1940s when they were house guests at a Lake Leelanau cottage. For the next few years, they rented *The House by the Side of the Road*, on Ingalls Bay. Bob then wanted to purchase a small bungalow on the Leland Golf Course, but Mary wanted to be on the Bay, and she found a gorgeous Omena Point cottage which was for sale.

ANDSCAPE PLANS FOR 2001. Your "Bored" of Directors is proceeding with a landscaping project which will compliment our clubhouse and waterfront property. Chairmen Laura Deibel and Michael "B" Biskupski have expressed both their enthusiasm for the project and their appreciation to landscape architect, Anita Silverman, who has donated the plans as a gift to the club. Laura has worked closely with Anita in planning, choosing the types of flowers and plants, and is donating a large green mountain sugar maple tree to the club.

The scope of the project is being discussed at this time. The committee is considering various irrigation options including pumping water from the bay or using the club's existing well. A permanent maintenance program, including the formation of a gardening committee, is also being considered.

More details will be announced after "Bozo" Biskupski comes out of hibernation. However, presently it is known that the landscaping will cost approximately \$15,000 and that the "Bored" is looking at a blending of club resources, with an emphasis on honorary gifts, to pay for this project. A complete landscape proposal will be posted at the club in June and presented at the annual meeting in July.

THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE, composed of Jane Saxton, Jay Grosmark and chairman Charlotte Read, is pleased to announce that Debby Disch has enthusiastically agreed to serve on your "Bored" of Directors, replacing retiring member Bob Johnson. Even though the lure of living on the golf course appealed to Bob, Mary prevailed and they purchased the **Newman Sisters**' cottage for \$12,000 in the early 1950s. For many years, she was known as "that woman who purchased the Newman house".

Bob and Mary have three children..... Bob Woolford who, at age sixteen, tragically died in an auto accident; Chuck Woolford, and Mary Jo Brumbaugh. She has three grandchildren.... Meg, Shelby, and Katie. Mary reminisced, "We enjoyed many happy times as a family coming to Omena. Bob really learned how to relax here. We both loved falling asleep to the sounds of the water."

Mary has many wonderful memories of her life with Bob; one that stands out clearly in her mind is the time Bob was chosen to represent the United States in the 1971 Soviet Union-American Heart Symposium in Moscow. Mary accompanied him; it was a very exciting experience. Sadly, five years later, Bob Woolford passed away.

Throughout the many years since Bob's death, Omena and OTYC have remained an important part of her life. Mary has spent her summers at the cottage entertaining Omena friends, family and out of town guests. Noted for her fabulous collection of hats, Mary sports a different one at each yacht club function. She entertains her guests by choosing a hat for each to wear during their visit.

Close neighbors have also been important to Mary. She recalled with a smile all the 'honey dos' **John Ray** has done for her over the years and the warmth and sensitivity of **Caroline Oberndorf**.


By the way, the "blond bombshell" who won the first OTYC ladies' singles tennis tournament was Jane Saxton. The year was 1963.








Professor Ace Turner with his students.....


