





Unlike last year, there were no exciting capsizes and







Congratulations to all the participants. Next year we hope to have even more boats decorate Omena Bay.



So we all toast the victors: **Skipper Caroline Turner**, ably assisted by her conniving father, **Ace**, and boat owner **Mark Spooner**.










Alison Biskupski, Esther Johnson, Jenny Fenton, Myles Cornwell and Woody Parker

Jenny also feels motivation contributes to the learning experience. Several types of incentives were successfully implemented last summer to keep the participants focused. For example, rubber bands were used to recognize campers' acts of merit. The rubber bands were awarded daily and totaled at the end of the week with prizes going to the top six places.

Other incentives also were successful in motivating the kids to master fundamentals of sailing. **Jenny** used paddles representing four levels of achievement to recognize performance. The paddles were named *Splash*, *Crew*, *First Mate* and *Skipper*, and to get one's name on a e, program participants had to demonstrate

paddle, program participants had to demonstrate proficiency in swimming, tying knots, hand signals, body positioning on a boat, safety, rigging, etc. By the end of the final session, there were forty names inscribed on the various paddles.

**Jenny** was backed by a very capable staff. **Myles Cornwell**, who is a senior at Traverse City West, was the lead sailing instructor. While relatively young in years,

Myles brought a lot of sailing experience to the program. He skippered his boat to a second place finish in the Interlake Nationals in Traverse City this summer and crewed on Kokimo in the Chicago to Mackinac race. He was assisted by **Woody Parker** who is a freshman at Pembroke Hill School in Kansas City, Mo. **Woody** has participated in the OTYC Youth Program for several years.

Alison Biskupski, a sophomore at Northwestern Michigan College, ran the tennis camp. Alison brought insights she gained through participating in the advanced tennis camp at Michigan State University. Assisting Alison was Esther Johnson a freshman at Saint Mary's High School in Lake Leelanau.

This year's tennis program featured several tournaments and a lot of moments to remember. Two of the players who really stood out in Alison's mind as 'center court stars of the future' were **Elliott Feeley** and **Alex Edgley**. But **Nate Schwarz** and **Braydon Dennis** may have played the most entertaining match of the year when they eked out a victory over **Michael Bosco** and **Matt Schwarze** 8 –6. There was plenty of 'table talk' between two brothers, one cousin and a buddy.

This year's Youth Program offered more than just sailing and tennis. Thursday field trips were taken to the Dunes, Peterson Park, Fun Country water slides in Traverse City, Crystal River for canoeing and Leland Yacht Club where sailing and water activities were enjoyed by the youth of the club.

Car washes were held each Friday afternoon to help build team spirit. The money earned will be used to purchase new bingo supplies for next year.

The OTYC Youth Program started in the summer of 1960. Prior to this time, the only organized youth activity was the Penguomenia fleet races. Sailing Penguins were Helen Ray, Rat Renz, Margy Lyon, Betsy Ehrhardt, Holly Smith, and other vintage 1950 cronies.

The first year the program ran from July 4<sup>th</sup> to August 22<sup>nd</sup>. Sailing, swimming and tennis were included in the initial year. Sailing classes were taught by **Al** and **Linda Cherne**. There were forty participants, and nine of the campers swam across Omena Bay from the club to Pikes dock. Since the club had not completed their new court, the tennis activities were held at the Smith Orchard.

Reminiscing, Linda Cherne commented: "It was great to have the same children in the program from July 4th until the end of August. Swimming was stressed. I can still remember that **Debby Smith Disch** swam alone from Gull Island to the shore."

Times have changed since 1960. Today, there are fewer children who spend the entire summer in Omena. Consequently, it is a real challenge to integrate the many new faces into the program each week and still make it challenging for those who have been there in weeks before.

In addition, as the children become teenagers, they lose interest in basic sailing and tennis. **Kara Bensley**, **Scrub** and **Joey Bensley's** 13 year old granddaughter, would enjoy participating in a play put on by teenagers.


Matt Schwarze, Michael Bosco, Braydon Dennis, and Nate Schwarze.





# OMENA TELL TALES

The cupola on an historic barn south of Leland caught the attention of **Scrub** and **Joey Bensley** as they drove by. They commented how perfectly a cupola like the one they just saw would enhance the vintage 1866 barn at their Craker Road farm.

A master craftsman, **Scrub** started construction on the project in 2000.....the only stipulation from **Joey** was that all the wood had to be at least one hundred years old. Most of the material came from old barns which had been torn down, and the louvers were made from lath removed from their home during one of their remodeling projects.



C o m p l e t e d, **Bensley's** new cupola was seven feet tall and weighed in excess of one thousand pounds.

Because of the weight, Gary Silverman and Dan S c h l e e f reengineered the roof structure and recommended new support rafters be installed. Antique rafter material was found in a barn

located behind the Sunset Lodge. **Scrub** tore it down board by board. Installation of the "new" rafters was a daunting project, but it was completed over the winter.

After a year of work, on June 11<sup>th</sup>, a spirited or soon to be spirited group of OTYC members came to **Scrub's** erection party. Unfortunately, he couldn't get it up because his boom wasn't long enough. **Joey** was not phased in the least noting that **Scrub** had never failed to get it up when he put his heart to it, and sure enough, on June 23<sup>rd</sup>, with the help of a longer boom, the cupola was lifted in place and now stands as a crowning jewel on their beautiful, centennial barn.

The cupola was in place just in time to welcome "Geraldine" ..... Scrub and Joey's recently purchased

### In Memoriam

Two revered members of OTYC, Waldo Abbot (12/30/16 – 5/24/01) and Tom Smith (10/28/22 – 8/01/01), passed away since the last edition of the *Breeze*. They will be missed at OTYC gatherings—Waldo in his colorful, plaid trousers and pastel shirts, and Tom in his madras jacket, white shirts and bow ties—both with smiles on their faces and twinkles in their eyes.

Waldo first came to Omena in 1926 when his father purchased 'The Abby' on Omena Pt. As a child, he had the distinction of owning the second outboard motor boat and ran it day and night interfering with 'Omena rest'. Waldo graduated from The University of Michigan and had a distinguished career as regional sales manager for Chrysler and later for R. L. Polk. He loved golfing, boating and playing bridge with the Moores. He is survived by his wife Ping, daughter Brenda and son Waldo IV.

After retiring from Federated Department Stores, Tom moved to Omena in 1986 to manage the family cherry orchard. He graduated from Kenyon College and the University of

Cincinnati and served in the Army Air Corps in WWII. In 1944 he married Martha Rule who predeceased him. With Mary, his wife of 28 years, he received the Cherry Promotion Award from the 1997 National Cherry Festival. He is survived by Mary, and his children Debby, Rink, Josephine, Stewart and Electa, brother Craig and sister Rat Renz.

Waldo and Jay Grosmark jokingly claimed to be brothers, because Jay's middle name is Waldo. Why was Jay given this name? Because, Waldo Abbot Sr. was Jay's father's favorite professor at Michigan.

According to **Bob Mosher**, Smith Orchard foreman, **Tom** felt the magic date for beginning the cherry harvest was August 1. The pros and cons of this date were debated each year. **Bob** reflected, "**Tom** made his point by passing away on August 1."
