

The SMITH Orchard - Rooted in Omena

The Smith family planted its roots in Omena long before there was a Yacht Club... in fact, long before there were cherry trees at the top of the hill. And, whether you're a relative newcomer to the area or your ties to the OTYC go back for a generation or two, your introduction to the Club probably closely coincided with an introduction to one of the Smiths.

The Smith family origins in Omena can be traced back to 1922, when what is now known as the Smith property, was purchased by Thomas S. Smith. The Omena orchard was one of seven owned by the Smiths and was converted from apple to primarily cherry production in the 1940's. Eventually, the Omena property was inherited by George and Helen Smith. George and Helen raised a large family in Omena, including Rat Renz and Bish Smith, who are still living, and Tom, Susan (who died at the age of two weeks), Smitty and Perc Smith who are now deceased.

More than a few of you must wonder how **Rat** got her nickname. It really goes back to when **Carolin** was lying in her basinet, shortly after her birth. Brother **Smitty** asked if he could take a peek at his new sister. After looking in the basinet, he exclaimed, "she looks just like a rat"... and the rest is history. **Smitty**, by the way, was the source for many of the **Smith** family nicknames.

In addition to raising a large progeny, George Smith also had a big hand in founding the OTYC back in 1948. At that time, some teenagers, including Bish, who later became a charter member, were looking for a place to race their sailboats. George, Andy Renz, Stewart Ayars, Gus Rogers, and Mary Foltz, convinced Hector and Jessie Carmichael to lease and subsequently donate the old 'Pavilion' (present OTYC clubhouse) and adjacent property to the community. Thus, the Yacht Club was born.

In the early years, **Helen Smith** was the 'official' social chairman. Many of the Club's social functions were

BYLAW AMENDMENT - Bill Sandt has proposed the following bylaw amendment which will be voted on at the Annual Meeting, July 14, 2002:

Article I Purpose - The purpose of the Omena Traverse Yacht Club is to promote the sport of sailing and boating in general. (Renumber all other Articles accordingly.)

In article V under Committees add 9. Sailing (In the alternative change Waterfront to Sailing)

Bill's purpose for submitting this amendment "....is that the club has veered from the purpose for which it was created." He would like to improve our sailing program and have weekly sunfish races, participate in races with other clubs, and send members to the Great Lakes Sailing Association meetings. To finance this, Bill is suggesting a \$1.00 surcharge for those attending potluck and catered dinners.

The Board of Directors recommends a vote against

adoption of the proposed amendment. The Articles of Incorporation already state ".....The purpose of this corporation is to further the interest of boating in Grand Traverse Bay and that the Board may create or discontinue a committee as appropriate for the operation of the club."

(SMITH ORCHARDcontinued from page 1) hosted by the **Smiths** in their home, probably because liquor was forbidden in the clubhouse at that time. Happily, that's a tradition that died an easy death years ago.

Although not a sailor himself, George was an enthusiastic supporter of youth sailing. In the late 1950's, Club members owned and raced a small fleet of Lightning sailboats. At that time, there was a group of people in Traverse City trying to organize a yacht club, but didn't have the facilities. George strongly encouraged their efforts to find a home, and the Grand Traverse Yacht Club came into being. The newly formed GTYC was soon challenging OTYC members and their Lightning fleet in a series of annual races appropriately named the George S. Smith Regatta by GTYC members.

Gordon Cornwell of Traverse City, who is now 82, was an early participant in these races. He still fondly remembers the spirited competition and the wonderful dinners hosted by George and Helen at the Smith Orchard on the Saturday night of the race. Incidentally, Gordon is the grandfather of Myles Cornwell who served us so ably last summer as the youth program sailing instructor.

George Smith's strong ties to the Episcopal Church in Chicago led him to organize the St. Christopher's Episcopal mission during the summer months. Services were held in the home now occupied by Les and Debby Disch. George called on Episcopal ministers vacationing in what now is the Austin Jones house, to conduct the services. Jack Bishop was a participating minister in those days and probably has some interesting stories he could share with you. The 'mission' later became the Episcopal Church in Northport.

A new generation of **Smiths** soon started working their way toward Omena. **Tom Smith** married **Martha Rule** in 1944. They had five children - **Debby Disch**, **Rink Smith**, **Josephine Robertson**, **Stewart Smith** and **Marian Electa Powell**. Although the **Tom Smith** family grew up in Cincinnati, they spent many pleasant summers in Omena. After **Martha's** death, **Tom** married **Mary** and introduced her to Omena and the orchard.

Omena and the orchard were revelations for **Mary**. She was a 'city girl' working as a chemist at Proctor and

Gamble. Familiar with 50'x60' city lots, she had never seen an orchard before coming to Omena. **Mary** admits being flabbergasted by the beauty and wide-open spaces of the Omena area.

Mary quickly acclimated herself to country life, and soon she and **Tom** began a needed replanting of the orchard in the mid-70's...ultimately replacing 11,000 trees. She also began a love affair with the cherry business that

Carolin Smith Renz is more commonly known as "Rat" Renz. She is the sister of George "Smitty" Smith, Tom "Tombo" Smith and longtime OTYC members Preston "Perc" Smith and Craig "Bish" Smith.

"Rat" is the daughter of George Smith, Sr. and daughter-in-law of Dr. Andy Renz, both of whom were Commodores of OTYC and are now deceased.



Debby Smith Disch is a daughter of "Tombo" and his first wife, Martha Rule Smith, who is deceased. Martha was a sister of Jonnie Rule Hodgson, who is therefore related, in one way or another, to just about everyone, including Joel Fischer, a relatively new member of OTYC.

remains very much alive today.

After spending parts of many summers in Omena, **Tom** retired from his position as Research Director at Federated Department Stores in Cincinnati and moved to Omena full time in 1987. **Tom** and **Mary** saw a lot of changes take place in the cherry business. The seasonal workers, mostly from Alabama, who came up to pick cherries gave way to mechanical shakers in the early 70's. Interestingly, a number of those workers still remain in contact with friends they made in Omena during the 60's and early 70's. In fact, the son of the "straw boss" was up last summer and got to see

Tom the week before he died.

OTYC members always have been welcome to visit and explore the **Smith Orchard**. In August, they are treated to the sight and sound of the shakers at work. Many of the children who once looked at the shakers with fascination, returned to work in the orchard when they were older. Children of OTYC members who have worked in the orchard over the years include: **Ward Pratt, Dave Dickerson, Matt Bishop, Andy Knorp, Tony Sova** and fifth generation Smith family members...**Valerie** and **Craig Smith** and **Martha Levick**. All these workers were served special treats twice a day.....a tradition which was greatly anticipated and appreciated.

Every October for the past several years, the **Smiths** have invited Yacht Club members to pick apples. The apple picking party has grown and turned into another OTYC

tradition which generally and not surprisingly ends up in a cocktail party at the Club.

Since their arrival full time in Omena, **Tom** and **Mary** have been active and enthusiastic goodwill ambassadors for Omena and the Yacht Club. **Glenn White** remembers his first walk through the Omena Woods property to the **Smith Orchard**. "I saw this man wearing a bow tie, standing on a tall ladder. I was a total stranger, but **Tom** welcomed me to his orchard and gave me a grand tour and an invitation to return any time." **Sunny Colling** remembers the **Smiths** as early volunteers to mind her store while she

visited her husband in the hospital...and the remembrances go on.

Sadly, **Tom** passed away last year on August 1. Ironically, it was the date he had picked years ago as the best date to begin the cherry harvest. It was also the exact date on which the "straw boss" died several years earlier. In the winter of 2001, a number of OTYC members took turns spending time with him, often helping him with his rehabilitation exercises and giving **Mary** a little respite. These will be remembered by many as special times, an opportunity to give back a little and share a few of **Tom's** favorite memories of the people and events that colored his life in Cincinnati

and Omena. A lucky few may even have persuaded him to divulge the origins of his signature bow ties.

Mary, the one-time Cincinnati city girl, continues to be active in her support of the Cherry Industry and the lot of today's cherry farmers. She is presently working on a patented new process for making tart cherry concentrate. The new process offers the opportunity to further enhance the potential benefits of the concentrate for people suffering from arthritis. Its medical benefits will be evaluated in the near future, and the results should be available within the year. If successful, the new process and the licensing agreements growing out of Mary's patent will improve the profitability of cherry growers across the country.

Today, **Debby** and **Les Disch** are managing the orchard, and a fifth generation of **Smiths** is experiencing the pleasures of Omena.

Boys and Girls at Work

Ary Helen Ray, Social Chairman, hosted the ladies of OTYC for coffee, tea, Finnish 'Omena' apple juice and tasty pastries. Social events for the season, responsibilities of Potluck hostesses, and Peggy Donaghy's duties were discussed and reviewed. The following suggestions were made: Hostesses prepare an appetizer for their potluck and whenever possible purchases of goods for potlucks and social events be made at the Omena Country Store.

It was reported that there have been a number of complaints about not having enough food at the "high season" potluck dinners attended by over one hundred and fifty people. Someone pointed out that the

present rules for bringing food may have been a reason for the skimpy selections available for the last people to be called.

Presently, it is suggested that you bring servings for the number of people in your party plus an additional ten portions. Therefore, if a couple attends they are obligated to bring enough food for twelve servings. On the other hand, a group of twenty is expected to bring portions for only thirty. Obviously, this formula is flawed.

The suggestion that there be a Potluck Policing Committee aka Potluck Police resulted in Marcia Biskupski, Jonnie Hodgson and Caroline Oberndorf volunteering to review, clarify and restate Potluck Policy for the comfort and



On Monday, July 15 Judy Balas has scheduled a catered dinner at OTYC for both OTYC members and the greater Omena community. The premiere showing of the video of Omena/Ahgosatown history told by Betty **Craker Armstrong** will be featured. The price is estimated at \$20.00 per person.

Carolyn Faught will supply old fashioned flowers for the celebrations. The Omena Quilters have been busy stitching a sesquicentennial quilt. And Janet Barth will publicize the events in the Enterprise.

Air the mothball smell out of the vintage clothing at the back of the closet so you can wear those cool clothes to the festivities. Mary, bring all your hats! Plan an entry for the parade.
