OMENA'S SESQUICENTENNIAL CELEBRATION

A lot of impetus for the celebration can be traced to

Scrub and Joey Bensley. The Bensleys are long term residents of Leelanau County and, as many of you know, Scrub was the president of the Omena Historical Society. Their goal was to have a celebration that was educational and entertaining.....with a focus on underscoring the rich history of Omena.

With the blessing of the Omena Historical Society, in 2000, an exploratory committee was formed which included Kathy Bosco, Betty Craker Armstrong, Gail Lang and Joey Bensley. After much discussion, they proposed producing an historical video to be shown at a celebration dinner and a musical program to be followed by an ice cream social.

A permanent committee, initially chaired by Kathy Turner, was formed. In the Fall of 2001, Kathy turned the leadership over to Joey Bensley. Sesquicentennial fever was contagious, and the following people joined the committee: Caroline Oberndorf, Annette Deibel, Mary Stanton, Judy Smart.

Judy Balas, Dave and Sally Viskochil, and George Anderson.

The committee soon expanded the list of planned activities to include a parade in "downtown" Omena, a

CLUB NEWS

Some good news for all of you who may have suffered through OTYC functions on hot summer days or been pelted by the occasional drip from our aging roof during a rainstorm. The OTYC Board has elected to address both of these long-standing problems next spring by installing a new roof and three large commercial fans to improve ventilation. The fans will exhaust large volumes of hot air, bringing in cooler ground level air. The ventilation project was the number one priority of the Preservation and Safety Committee, and can be done very economically at the time of the re-roofing.

Half of the project will be funded with existing cash reserves, with the balance coming from a \$50.00 per member assessment recently approved by the Board. As you are aware, the Board may approve an assessment up to the amount of annual dues for extraordinary expenses. This assessment will be billed with your 2003 dues in January.

Marsha Buehler commented: "A roof project is not much fun, but we will all enjoy the fresh air next summer."

ANNUAL MEETING – 2002 Thirty-nine members attended the 2002 annual meeting. Since Bill Sandt's proposed amendment to the bylaws did not involve any cost

to the members, the meeting atmosphere was very congenial and remained that way until the "Bored" spiced things up with several announcements.

Barb Harris, Membership Committee Chairman, stated the club has 146 membership units which translates into 252 adult and 49 juniors memberships. New regular members for 2002 include: Jim and Kathy Browning, Jeff and Mia Drinan, Bruce and Nicolette Harper, Donald and Betsy Leathery, Charles and Linda Melville, and Dean and Leigh Anne Leathery Wallace. There are nine approved guest memberships.

Social Committee Chairman, Mary Helen Ray reported: "The 2002 season began with the Opening Dinner, chaired by Caroline Oberndorf and Marcia Biskupski. We served a full house with Peggy preparing a delicious meal. Catered dinners were planned by Judy and Bruce Balas throughout the twelve months. Special dinner themes added interest to this year's program. Kathy Turner continued to co-ordinate Potlucks.

Special events were planned by Judy Smart and Marsha Buehler. The post season activities were coordinated by Nancy and Bill Sandt with help from Deibel, Sarvis, Pohlod, Bishop, Balas and Schleef.

We had lots of helpful volunteers, which makes everyone feel more a part of the activities. Thanks for the excellent cooperation."

Building and Grounds Committee Chairman, **Tom Buehler**, reported that 30 members attended an extensive "clean up party" on June first. He also was pleased that the ladies^b restroom now has two toilets and that all are modern, low flush efficiency units. **Tom** commented on the condition of the roof, estimating that the cost to put in a new ventilation system and roof would be between \$20,000 and \$30,000.

Marsha Buehler announced that the Youth Program has added Junior Instructor positions. It is the hope that this will develop future instructors from within our membership, as well as provide an activity for our underserved teenage members. The instructors this year were Alison Biskupski, Esther Johnson, Mike Okma, Woody Parker, Chelsea Mason, and Haden Gulsby. Junior Instructors were Sam Cooper, Kara Bensley, Clark Gulsby and Lucy Loveless.

John Smart stated that the tennis court has a new paved apron and a professionally painted surface. The cost of this project was \$11,000. The purchase of a ball machine to be used by the youth program and by the general membership

is planned. Immediately after the meeting Mary Woolford offered to donate a ball machine in the name of her husband **Bob Woolford**. Kudos and thanks to you, Mary, for this generous gift.

Since the Opening Dinner used to be held on the 4th of July and some people have missed having a 4th celebration at the club, Nana Kennedy has volunteered to chair a 4th of July Potluck Picnic with the club providing brats and everyone attending contributing the salads, casseroles and desserts. Because of their tremendous popularity this past summer,


an Omena Community Picnic at Villa Marquette followed by a Barn Dance at the Smith Barn are being planned by Club 21.


TENNIS NEWS

Hodgson Cup Winners Judy Knorp & John Smart and Runner ups Ned Davis and Alison Biskupski







her toe injury, Cindy Standley substituted for Helen Bradley who left Omena prior to the Consolation Finals.







On Sunday, there was something for everyone. There were guided tours of the little cemetery at the Presbyterian Church and the buildings and grounds of the Villa Marquette. At the end of the day, Sesquicentennial attendees were treated to a wonderful musical program at the church followed by an old-fashioned ice cream social served on the church grounds by **Judy** and **Bruce Balas** and friends.



There was standing room only at a celebration dinner held on Monday at the OTYC for yacht club members and other Omena residents who were lucky enough to get tickets. The process of producing this video began with six hours of interviewing and video taping local historian **Betty Craker Armstrong** and was followed by 70 hours of research, script writing, and film editing. According to **Bill**, "It was a wonderful experience working with **Betty**.....the only sad thing is that Ahgosatown has disappeared from the face of the earth."

The next day, many joined Caroline Oberndorf at the Craker Farm to begin a tour of seven historic barns. The barn tour was wonderful – subliminally emphasizing the ongoing struggle between the agrarian based economy and the developers... Millard Mack

Credit for the memorable parade that closed the Sesquicentennial Celebration must be given to **George Anderson** – Northport resident but son of Omena. **George** organized the parade through downtown Omena that people are still talking about. He was able to have traffic diverted on M-22 for three hours, to design a route where one could see both sides of the parade without having to move, to solicit fifty-five entrants and get them organized and ready to start precisely at 7:00 p.m., and to have the Coast Guard helicopter cruise the parade route from above seconds before

the event began.

on the most desirable court in the state, we knew we wanted to be a part of this club."




"We look forward to getting more involved in the future and getting to know the other OTYC members."

Those in the Omena community who had the privilege of knowing him remember that he loved this area, from the time when he was a young boy until he moved to Minneapolis in later life to live close to one of his sons. Fred and Ruth Gorham lived in the Schwartz cottage near the Yacht Club. He spent many years as treasurer of OTYC and, due to the proximity of their cottage to the Club, he was an ever vigilant mechanical helper as well as good friend to anyone who drove onto the premises or needed help with a boat on the bay.
