

# PENCROFT.....

...... "an inspiration for romance."

One of the special benefits of editing the *Breeze* is the occasional opportunity to step back in time and explore the secrets and history of one of Omena's wonderful old cottages. We had such an

opportunity last summer when **Ed** and **Caroline Oberndorf** shared the story of Pencroft, their 105 year-old cottage....a cottage that has been the scene of and inspiration for books, plays, community srevice and perhaps, most importantly, romance.

It all started in 1898, when **John W.S. Pierson**, a hardware store owner from Stanton, Michigan, and his wife **Clara** built the home. **John** supplied the "nuts and bolts." **Clara** brought her love for writing and the theater.

Between 1898 and 1924, Clara Dillingham Pierson wrote a number of books directed at seven to ten year olds with titles like Among the Forest People, Among the Farmyard People, Adventures of Bobby Raccoon, Peter Cottondale, Grandfather Frog, Three Little Millers and The Millers at Pencroft—tales of summer adventures in Omena. Clara had a fair amount of success as a writer and in fact named the cottage Pencroft because, as the story goes, her pen helped to finance the purchase of their "croft" or cottage site.

During her summers at Pencroft, Clara demonstrated a penchant for making friends of all ages. In the early 1900s, she struck up a friendship with Mary Louise Frackelton who wisited Omena for the first time in 1910 at the

THE WORK ON THE ROOF as we go to press has begun by Weatherhead Roofing, Inc., a factory certified GAF contractor. This certification will substantially extend the life of the warranty. The scope of the project includes installation of three power attic ventilators which should make us all more comfortable on those hot summer evenings.

The contract price is \$19,200 including everything except the cost for extension of electrical power to the roof and for any bad structural wood which needs to be replaced. The overall price will be substantially less than anticipated last summer when the project was authorized.



age of 8. Mary Louise stayed for many summers with her Aunt (Mrs. James A. Parsons) in the cabin now called the Dry Rot Yacht Club. In 1994, at the age of 92, she wrote down the following reminiscences of her early memories of Omena and her relationship with Clara Dillingham Pierson: "Mr. and Mrs. Pierson of course were distinct memories of my childhood for they were great walkers, traveling separately because they were also great talkers. They always stopped in front of the cabin if any of us were on the big porch, Mrs. Pierson to converse interestingly, Mr. Pierson to skip from odd unrelated subject to subject, drawn from a mind Auntie said was like an old fashioned roll top desk with quantities of pigeon holes.

Mrs. Pierson wrote two plays for us, an early one in 1914 which I produced behind a blanket hung between two trees by the Saxton house. This masterpiece in which Elizabeth and Betty Saxton took major parts was about a German spy on our Point.

The other play, in 1919, with me as the leading character, had a plot only vaguely remembered but with the unforgettable title: 'The Deadly Amorita' We practiced the play on the stage in front of the Pencroft cottage stairwell, and it was performed at the Pavilion, now the OTYC."

With memories of Omena in her head and her future ahead of her, Mary Louise went on to complete her education. After graduating from Laurel School and Wellesley College, she earned degrees from the Cleveland School of Art and the New York School of Fine and Applied Art, Paris branch. Later she married Charles Gleason,

and they had two children Charles and Caroline.

Memories of Omena continued to remain strong, and Mary Louise and Charles were soon bringing their family to the Omena area each summer. For a while they lived like gypsies, staying at a lodge in Northport, a cottage on Ingalls Bay and at the Moore cottage. In 1954, Mary Louise realized one of her long-standing dreams when she and Charles purchased *Pencroft* from the Pierson heirs, commencing the Gleason-Vail-Oberndorf years. Sadly, Charles Gleason's enjoyment of *Pencroft* was brief as he died in 1956. In February of 1965, Mary Louise married Herman "Dutch" Vail.

Mary Louise brought a lot of character and style to Omena Point. Caroline recalls her mother as having a good head for business, a passion for the arts and was always a great role model for future women leaders. She was a trustee and the only woman to have served as President of Cuyahoga County Hospital. Her commitment to public service was well recognized in Ohio, and over the years she received numerous awards including the United Appeal Distinguished Service Award, Cleveland Chamber of Commerce Gold Medal for Public Service, and a commendation from the Ohio General Assembly.

Fittingly, people on Omena Point still remember *Pencroft* as **Mary Louise's** stage. From the very first days at *Pencroft*, she royally entertained her Omena and out of town friends there. The parties were legendary. Uniformed maids served the guests cocktails and appetizers, and everyone was expected to dress 'to the nines'. She was a gracious hostess who believed in spirited, high energy

gatherings. Often to stimulate conversation, she had guests change tables as the courses progressed during dinner.

A founder of the Omena Woods Association, Mary Louise was also a strong supporter of the OTYC, its youth program and tennis in particular.

The time was right for the next generation to

experience the joys of *Pencroft*. **Caroline**, following her mother's footsteps, graduated from Laurel School and Wellesley College. On a blind date, she met Dartmouth graduate **Ed Oberndorf**. *Pencroft* would play a key role in the development of their relationship.

On **Ed's** first visit to *Pencroft*, he fell victim to the magic of the cottage and to romance, and when he saw **Caroline** on the steps of her historic cottage framed by the backdrop of the blue waters of the bay, he was powerless to do anything but drop to his knees and propose. They were married in the fall of 1958, and *Pencroft* soon became an important part of their life together.

Ed and Caroline have three sons: Charlie is a teacher and writer of science fiction books; Michael is the senior vice president of KeyCorp Bank; and Rob is an attorney-adventurer. They all have wonderful memories of summers in Omena and the OTYC youth program.

In the tradition of her mother, Caroline is very involved with the Omena Woods Association, is a gracious hostess and a tireless, enthusiastic and able volunteer for yacht club activities. She also has a marvelous sense of humor and is lots of fun.

Ed has developed a keen interest in the history of Omena. One warm summer evening in 1982, a group was gathered at *Pencroft* and Ed suggested that they organize for the purpose of studying the history of Omena. Mary Louise Vail immediately jumped to her feet and offered to contribute \$1000 to support this endeavor. Thus, the Omena Historical Society was born. Ed and Caroline have been very active in the Society, and Ed has served as President and lately as a source of inspiration and direction in the development of the first written history of Omena ...... Omena...... A Place in Time. Appropriately, the idea for the book was born on the porch at Pencroft.

Pencroft reveals the warmth, love, caring and happiness of the families who have lived there. In recent years, Ed and Caroline have been sharing this special place with their grandchildren Michelle, David, Christy and Andy.

A walk through the cottage exposes inscriptions carved on the walls, probably done in 1898. The message in the living room reads: "To Rest: a field that has rested yields an abundant harvest."..... a fitting testimonial to the restorative powers of summers at *Pencroft* and Omena.

## A DAY AT THE OTYC RACES by Ace Turner



Ten boats competed for the elegant Biskupski Trophy. In keeping with a long-standing tradition, the trophy's namesake, Mike Biskupski piloted the race chase boat. His crew was last year's winner of the trophy, Caroline Turner and Alison Biskupski. Two races were completed, and in both races the top five finishers crossed the line within two minutes of each other.

In order to find out why, we selected eight candidates and asked them to fill out a survey about when they first came to Omena, how they met their husband, and what his initial reaction was to our 'Garden of Eden'.

The responses were so much fun and went far beyond what we expected to hear. We hope you will enjoy their stories as much as we did.

Here is the deal....pictured are the eight ladies we surveyed. The challenge for you is to match each story with the correct picture.

#1 "My first memories of Omena were when we came after the war in 1946. I remember fondly being with Aunt Nettie Fordham and seeing the water and the beauty of Omena. To illustrate how times have changed, I spent hours in college writing the three restaurants in the County for a job. Cedar Lodge, Leland Lodge and the Blue Bird all replied that they had filled their jobs and didn't need any summer help even though I told them I smiled and laughed a lot and that my nickname was 'Gig'.

I met my husband on a blind date and earned my second date with him when he bet that I couldn't start the outboard engine on his boat. He didn't know that I learned how to pull and start a gas pump at the Smiley cottage to get water out of the Bay. The rest is history!

Oh yes, my husband thinks that fresh water isn't so bad after all...he grew up on Cape Cod."

#2 "I came to Omena when I was ten years old when the community was much smaller. There were no phones and people went to the pay phone in Omena to conduct their business.

I met my husband on New Years Eve in Los Angeles when Michigan State University was playing in the Rose Bowl long ago. He came to Omena in 1956 for the first time and loved it ... thought it was beautiful and fun. As our family grows so do our Omena experiences – engagements, weddings, fun with grandchildren, summers and Christmas."

#3 "I came to Omena with my family to visit the Ray's cottage in 1966 or so. I loved the beach, as I can see in the old home movies.

I met my husband in Hong Kong just after I moved there to teach English at a local school. He came to Omena in 1987 and loved it a lot, since he loves sailing and the water. His parents have come from their native country to visit Omena twice. We can't look out at the bay without thinking of them."

#4 "In 1950 was the first time mother brought me to Omena. We stayed in a perfectly horrid cottage....no hot water and only one bathroom. However, I thought I was in God's country. I still feel this way. By the way, that cottage is now occupied by Jeanne Hines and is now one of the most beautiful homes on Ingalls Bay.

I met my husband on a blind date arranged by dear friends. Our first small talk, when he stated he was in the meat packing business and sold Maiden Forms, led me to believe that I would never forgive my friends. On arrival, I asked for a martini (first one ever) and they left for a kitchen consultation. After several martinis, dinner and dancing I knew I was going to marry him (I did not inform the man as he had a reputation for running out from commitments.) He still gives me my morning martini. My father made me promise (on his death bed) that any man I was interested in would have "Trial by Omena". He had seen too many of my infatuations turn to ashes on my part. He was invited in the summer of 1957. It rained. We walked in the rain, and on the beach in the rain (he had such cute legs and still does and that is why we are still together) and we watched rain from the porch. He passed the test with honors.

My husband's first impressions of Omena were threefold....the overwhelming beauty and quaintness of Omena, the bay and the woods....the warmth of the cottages and townspeople....and the vibrancy and loveliness of his future mother-in-law to be with whom a very close bond was initiated that was eternal. Lastly, he was promised that he would view his first treefrog. He never spotted one but one evening at twilight he thought he saw something flying through the treetops, wondering to this day whether it might have been E T visiting the unique and mystic world of Omena and departing knowing there is nothing like it in the universe."

#5 "I was born in 1954, and I have come to Omena every summer of my life.

In December 1971, when my all girls' school, Hillsdale in Cincinnati, was putting on a play and needed guys, my husband tried out and got the lead role! He visited Omena for the first time in 1972 and he has never missed a summer here since then.

We love lots of things.....multicolored northern lights; flashlight tag on the hill; "Killer" on the OTYC balcony; spoons at Granny's; sleep outs on the beach and in the tree house; watching my husband and kids grow to cherish their time here."

#6 "I came to Omena when I was 14 years old. I loved it. We would get up in the morning, put on our bathing suits, eat breakfast and go to the beach. We were very serious about our tans; and not wanting to miss a moment of sun, my two sisters and I would "discuss" who was going to go up to the house and make sandwiches, etc. I can remember the agony of missing 15 minutes of sun. Those were the days!

I met my husband when he was in my sister's class in kindergarten, but he didn't make much of an impression on me then. I really noticed him in the summer of my senior year in high school. He was an older man having already completed two years of Yale. I was dating someone else but he was in Maine for a month. He came over to show my sister his new guitar and I made sure he noticed how wonderful I thought he was.

Fortunately, my sister left with another friend...he needed a date for a Proctor and Gamble Day at Coney Island where we stood in huge long lines and talked and talked. We had the best time. Too bad for the guy who went to Maine!

Since my "new friend" had gone to camp Hayo-went-ha, he knew the area and loved it. From the very beginning, he loved Omena as a place to get away from it all and relax. He loves to read and my mother, sisters and I would knit, work puzzles and play cards. Dad would always have jazz playing. And when it rained we would go into town and eat ice cream and fudge.

Many of these same traditions are continued at our new cottage on Ingalls Bay."

#7 "I first came to Omena in 1941 and stayed in the Herman Cottage (now owned by Jeanne Hines). I slept in a tiny dark room with my sister.

I met my husband when I was a freshman at Northwestern University. We were studying in the library across the table from each other. He came to Omena for the first time in 1957. I sent him a picture of an old run down house with no wires of any kind going into it and told him it was ours. He was quite relieved to find we had electricity and water and has been "in love" with Omena ever since."

#8. "I came to Omena in 1937 at eight months of age. I

can't recall many impressions but I am certain Omena was in my blood.

I met my husband at a Northwestern University football game. We were both working at Harris Bank in Chicago in the trust department. In July 1959, when we were engaged to be married, he came to Omena for the first time. His liking Omena was a major "test".

I am grateful that my parents had a strong friendship with another prominent Omena family and that they had the foresight to purchase in 1936 the only available home in the area at that time. I have always felt from a child until and including the present day that we tolerate 8-9 months elsewhere so we can spend 3-4 months in Omena."




