





The front porch and chairman **Dave Pohlod**, welcomed everyone for Tuesday and Thursday Toddy Time starting at five o'clock. **Brenda White** once again coordinated the brunch before the sunfish race and **Lisa Newland** organized the complimentary lunch in conjunction with the Big Boat Race. The **Kennedys** and **Scarletts** planned the 4<sup>th</sup> of July Picnic which featured the Whiffenpoofs, and two ladies luncheons were hosted by **Melissa Chenault** and **Mary Loveless**.

**YOUTH PROGRAM:** Marsha Buehler reported that this year the program lasted for six weeks with weekly fees of \$65.00 for members/\$85.00 for non members.

The staff included directors Chelsea Mason and Woody Parker; instructors Andy Bradford, Diana Drinan, Clark Gilsby, and junior instructors Billy

Buchholz, Stewart Taylor, Alex Edgely, and Jeff Bailey. "I was delighted with the staff, their performance, and their enthusiasm. There were four lifeguards, a first responder, and three very accomplished tennis players among the group."

Parent coordinators were **Karen Edgley** and **Kerry** and **David Magrini**. Their role was to organize the details of the outings and to recruit parent drivers.

"The most positive aspect is that there is a good, solid, interested group of instructors and instructor candidates who are 'coming up through the ranks'. Since our largely 'homegrown' instructors have lodging as well as an understanding of our particular program, there are distinct advantages to keeping the instructor base largely within the OTYC community."

BUILDING and GROUNDS: Judy and Bruce Balas stated our building is in excellent condition and expressed their appreciation to previous chairman Tom Buehler for his diligent work.

In the process of pumping the septic tank in June, the intake hose for the irrigation system was nicked by a metal probe. This teeny weenie hole allowed air in the line disabling the entire irrigation system. The air leak was located and has been fixed.

Ventilating Sun Shades were installed on the porch to make cocktails on the deck more comfortable. Some of the wood flooring on the main deck will be replaced and a heavy nautical rope fence will be installed at the waterfront on the lawn north of the wharf.

"Squirrels and chipmunks are thriving and doing very

well, thank you. These critters have numerous secret entrances as well as the ability to open the front screen door with their little noses. They eat any food left in the open. Therefore, please remove all food including chips, etc. from the building. In addition, we ask that the front door be shut when the club is not in use."

The first Saturday in June 2005 will be the annual cleaning party. Please mark your calendar....your help will be appreciated.

WATERFRONT: Tom Buehler reported that after performing a site review and extensive analysis with a professional engineering firm, it is concluded that no immediate repairs are needed at the main dock or at the launch ramp. Both are functioning well and are in good operating condition.

"Thank you to **Alan Read** for his single handed care of "Ed", the youth program power boat. She continues to purr along, like an old Timex.

There is an emerging challenge in our youth program sailing fleet. Last year the program ended the season with six boats. These will require constant attention. The club would appreciate the donation of any serviceable sunfish or sunfish parts. An alternative is to consider another type of sailing vessel, one with a jib, which would serve as a better instructional/teaching craft, such to be used in concert with the sunfish."

**NEW MEMBER LIMIT:** The Board announced the membership is now at a "full status"; applications for any new members, except for legacies, will be placed on a waiting list.

**RENTAL GUIDELINES:** The club facilities will only be rented to members and relatives of members. Weddings are limited to the months of June and September. Guidelines for use of the OTYC facility for private events are available.

BYLAW PROPOSAL: Because there was not a quorum present, the proposed bylaw proposal to establish two boundaries giving preference to those living within the defined "Omena Boundary" was tabled for one year. There was a healthy discussion on the subject and there was overwhelming support for the concept. However, the consensus was the "Omena Boundary" needed to be more restrictive in size.

Therefore, in the May Breeze a "new and improved" bylaw proposal will be outlined. In the meantime, any input on this issue will be welcome.

**OPEN DISCUSSION:** Rat Renz suggested that the initiation fee be increased to \$2,000.

**ELECTION:** Sam Knoll's slate of Board members, **Debby Disch**, **Bill Knorp**, and **Tom Buehler** was accepted unanimously; and retiring members, **Marsha Buehler** and **Mary Tonneberger** were thanked for their outstanding service to the club over the past six years.

#### REFLECTIONS

Both Marsha Buehler and Mary Tonneberger went beyond the "call of duty" as Board Members. After serving as commodore for two years, Mary accepted the job as treasurer and Marsha continued to chair the youth program. We asked each to comment on the other's contributions to the OTYC.

Mary "T": "Marsha has been a pillar of progress for OTYC during her years on the Board. So many things were accomplished, from redirecting the Youth program and encouraging a 'farm system' for instructors to placing a high value on the continual upkeep of the building and grounds. She, along with Tom, have been

tireless in organizing events that bring the members together for many ways across all generations. We have been very fortunate to have had **Marsha's** talents in leading the club."

Marsha B: "Mary helped with the kitchen addition, was instrumental in getting the landscaping and irrigation designed and installed, redesigned the upstairs loft and got bathrooms renovated. She has been level headed and analytical when there was a problem or controversy to be confronted. She was an excellent, hands-on, low key commodore and a pleasure to follow. As treasurer, she has kept an eagle eye on all aspects of club finances, and has been determined to develop a long-range budget, which was accomplished this year with **Debby's** input."







Once again the race shaped up to be a clash of old



## OMENA HISTORICAL SOCIETY MOVES PUTNAM-CLOUD 'TOWER' HOUSE TO OMENA

In the fall of 2003 a small group of people were alerted to the fact that a part of Omena's history was going to be demolished. A farmhouse built in the mid 1870s by Rinaldo Putnam, sold to the Cloud family of Cincinnati in 1893 for a summer home was given to the Jesuits in 1936 for use as a summer retreat. Over the years the house, known to locals as the 'Tower House', had fallen into disrepair. The Jesuits no longer had a use for it and did not want to maintain the house. The group approached

the Omena Historical Society with the idea of taking on the project of saving the structure as a future home for the Omena Historical Society. With the endorsement of the Omena Historical Society, the decision was made to move forward. The Jesuits agreed to donate the house if it was moved from its location at Villa Marquette. They also offered to contribute \$10,500 toward the cost of the move.

After several months of searching for a permanent site for the house, an agreement was finally secured with the Omena Village Preservation Association to lease a portion of their property in the village of Omena. Plans to move the house were finalized and on June 17, 2004 a large

number of people turned out on a rainy day to witness the big event. All was in place; utility companies at their stations, the media with cameras and recorders,

and police on standby to escort the 'grand old lady' to her new home. But alas, trouble was brewing at the Villa.


The premier mover in the state arrived for a last check and found a major I-beam had bent. To continue the operation would have been extremely risky. Therefore, everyone was told the move was canceled and would be attempted again on June 24th.

June 24, 2004 dawned with overcast skies but no rain. Again the village was filled with spectators, utility

companies, etc. and this time the crowd was treated to the exciting spectacle of flashing red lights followed by a huge truck with the house perched on top of a mammoth trailer. It was skillfully backed into a portion of land that looked like it would never accommodate the size of the structure. Much to the amazement of everyone, within a


short time, the house was moved into its permanent place. Not only did it fit but also it complimented the other buildings in the village.

Work on restoring the house began immediately and continued throughout the summer with a foundation, new roof, exterior repairs and new coat of paint. The new home of the Omena Historical Society is now ready for winter, and next spring work on the interior will begin. The success of the project to this point is a tribute to the many people who put countless hours as well as financial contributions into saving an historic part of Omena. A comment heard continually is, "the house fits so well and it looks like it has been there forever."

Caroline Oberndorf refused to pose for a picture because "I don't even exist." In June, Caroline






