LARRY BENSLEY......In August 1997, Commodore Carolyn Marbach identified the need for the club to have long term planning for future facility needs. Carolyn created the Preservation and Safety Committee and appointed Ole Kiersey, Gary Silverman, Larry Bensley and chairman Dan Schleef as members. The intent of the plan was to collect information regarding the needs and interests of the membership so a long range plan for preservation and safety could be developed. In 2001, Larry was appointed chairman of this committee.

The Preservation and Safety Committee identified five categories which best represented the OTYC property and its use. These categories were waterfront, building and grounds, kitchen, playground and youth program. During the summer of 1998, focus groups met to identify present and anticipated needs over ten years. The issues were then converted into a five page questionnaire which was sent to 210 members. Fifty-four percent of the questionnaires were returned.

As a result of the survey and because of very supportive commodores, Boards of Directors and the general membership, a very large percentage of the recommended projects have been completed. The major ones include, landscaping and installation of a sprinkler system, remodeling and expanding the kitchen, adding a toilet in the ladies' room, expanding and resurfacing the tennis court, and new playground equipment. In addition, there were thirty-three other improvements made to the OTYC facilities.

Because their objectives have largely been completed, the Board of Directors decided it was time to retire the committee. Thanks to **Larry** and the people who worked on this project for the past eight years. Well done!





# The Secrets of OTYC's Mona Lisa

I like messing around in kitchens and solving mysteries. So not surprisingly, recently I found myself standing in the Yacht Club kitchen admiring the colorful and spirited painting of the charwoman with her mop. I wondered where she came from and what kind of story she had to tell.

My musing was suddenly interrupted by an obvious nonappreciator of the arts .... "I hate this painting — in fact I hate it so much I moved it to the men's room!" a voice from behind me growled. Part of the mystery was solved. I now knew where the painting had spent part of its life...., but I needed to know more, much more.

In the process of unraveling the story, I was to discover a critically acclaimed artist with ties to Omena and the **Knorp's** family room in Auburn, California. More on that later.

I brushed the "art critic" aside and on a whim turned the painting around. On the back I found the statement "donated to the OTYC in 1980. W. Little, artist". Further research indicated that the painting was probably donated to the club by Emily Nash Smith for a fund raiser and that W. Little was one of her students.

More research revealed that **Emily Nash Smith** graduated from Indiana State Normal in 1916. She eventually started spending her summers at her farm on Overlook Road, Omena where she collected and sold antiques, had a tea and sandwich business and painted. **Jonnie Hodgson** fondly recalls having tea and sandwiches at the *Overlook Farm*. "We would dress to the nines. The food was served on the best china. It was wonderful."

Jonnie also commented that at this time Emily Nash Smith was known in Omena as *Mrs. Antique Smith* while **Helen Smith**, **Debby Disch's** grandmother, had the nickname of *Mrs. Orchard Smith*. While she may have dabbled in tea and antiques, **Emily Nash Smith** soon was to gain national recognition as an artist.

For example, she is listed in the Who's Who of American Artists and had a one-person show at the Mouffe Gallery, Paris, France in 1975. Her paintings have hung in the Spanish



Embassy, Washington DC, Ford Motor Company Headquarters, Michigan Bell Headquarters and Michigan State University. During the time she resided in Florida, **Emily** taught at the Institute of Fine Art and owned an art gallery.

A New York art critic once wrote: "She has a great gift in the use of color and her work shows immense feeling and sensitivity. Her quest for an elusive and indefinable thing appears to have come close to a stunning success."

Starting in 1952, **Emily Nash Smith** taught art classes from nine until noon at her home on Overlook Road. People of all ages....men, women, boys and girls took her classes

One of the students was **Marty Feely (Bills)** who was a very young girl spending summers in Omena with

her grandmother, **Martha Feely**. **Marty** loved her art lessons at the *Overlook Farm* and subsequently became an accomplished artist.

It wasn't until many years after her lessons that **Marty** learned **Emily Nash Smith** had told her grandmother that she "had no talent and should quit her art lessons now!" However, **Marty** indeed proved her wrong.

Getting back to the painting hanging in the kitchen, we have not uncovered any information about its artist other than the name **W. Little**. Nor do we have any information about the subject in the picture other than it might have been **Frances Seblacek** who worked in the OTYC kitchen.

Here are a few comments from some of our members about the painting: **Rat Renz**: "That is one of my very favorite pictures!"; **Kathy Bosco**: "I love it and it is in the right place. The kitchen is where all the work takes place!" **Melissa Chenault**: "She has found joy in what she is doing."

In a prior Breeze article, **Peggy Donaghy** commented on the painting: "The expression on this lady's face reminds me of **Mary Woolford** and her enthusiasm for life. I'd love to be like her. I'd put on some **Eric Clapton** music and just dance around the kitchen."

We conclude that **W. Little** could have been one of **Emily Nash Smith's** older and better students because the painting reflects her use of colors and style.

A large painting by **Emily Nash Smith** was given to the **Knorps** by **Judy's** parents. It is of a cherry orchard in full bloom and named *A Promise of Plenty*. This painting hangs in their family room in Auburn, CA and has been a constant reminder of the beauty of Omena.

If you are interested in seeing some of **Emily Nash Smith** works which are for sale, give her grandson, **Tom Van Pelt** a call at 386-5234.

The next time you are in the kitchen, take a moment to look at the dancing lady with the wistful smile. We hope you will feel the joy and happiness exuding from this painting and not want to return it to the men's restroom. By the way, there is a prize if you can guess the name of the critic.

Last year's winner, **Stu Mulligan** said: "It was fun winning, but those bums drank all the beer five minutes after the award's ceremony and left none for me!"




# 2004 YOUTH PROGRAM

The fun begins at 10 am and runs to 12 when we break for lunch. Lunch and drinks are provided.











**Scott Mulligan** regarding **Helen Jones** 100 birthday.... The birthday party was a HUGE success. It was so very





## OMENA HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEWS

The Omena Historical Society had a fun and challenging 2004 and has many exciting activities on the horizon. We ended the year with a beautiful Holiday Serenade concert in the Omena Presbyterian Church, attended by over 150 people, both OHS members and local residents.

The setting in the village for the Putnam-Cloud-Tower House makes it appear that the location has always been waiting for its arrival. A fresh coat of paint, new plantings, and holiday decorations added to the festive note, especially with the beautiful snowfalls. This spring, there are many plans afoot for starting on the interior.

In terms of fund raising, we are at over 70 percent of our goal. The committee has submitted grant requests and received two to date- one from the Leelanau Township Community Foundation and the other from the Grand Traverse Band. More are in the pipeline.

An ardent supporter of Omena and the OHS, **David Viskochil**, died suddenly on February 18, 2005. His death is a great loss to not only the Omena Historical Society and the Omena Community but the surrounding areas as well. **David** devoted much of his talent and energy to the arts, education,

and communities of Leelanau and Grand Traverse Counties. He had a passion for Omena and never declined to help if it meant making the small hamlet a better place to live. Generosity, creativity, community spirit and dedication to helping others were part of **David's** life.

For over thirty years he made the Tamarack Gallery a source of support for local and regional artists. Perhaps most importantly, **David** continuously challenged his friends and fellow community members to be visionary in the stewardship of Leelanau County's natural and cultural resources and the most positive aspects of our way of life.

His contributions to the Omena Historical Society were numerous. He was never too busy to help with projects such as the sesquicentennial, the publication and sale of the book, *Omena a Place in Time*; the barn dance, serving as a board member and working on the Christmas musical program. Because of **David** and **Sally**, Omena has its own flag, which they designed and underwrote for the sesquicentennial. They also graciously provided the use of the Tamarack Gallery to the OHS for receptions for the book contributors as well as the book signing. When it came to the most recent project of restoring the Putnam-Cloud Tower House, no one was more dedicated to seeing it become a reality.

Those who knew him, his family, friends, and business associates will remember him with sadness, but at the same time as a unique person who made a difference.

# IN MEMORIAM

JACK BISHOP 1927-2004

The Rev. Dr. John (Jack) Wesley Bishop, 77, born November 6, 1927 in Kingston, New York, son of Bertrand Bishop and Emma Schoonmaker, died peacefully November 28, 2004 in Ft. Myers, Florida.

Jack graduated from Phillips Academy, Andover, Massachusetts in 1945, received a B.A. from Yale University in 1950, served in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1947-1949, earned a Masters of Divinity (M.Div.) from the Virginia Theological Seminary in 1954 and a Doctor of Ministry from the Colgate Rochester Divinity School (Bexley Hall) in 1977. He was ordained an Episcopal Priest in 1954 in Cincinnati, Ohio, where he served as Rector at St. Timothy's Episcopal Church from 1956—1971. He was on the staff of Coventry Cathedral as Industrial Chaplin in England in 1967. He was

Rector at St. Thomas Episcopal Church in Rochester, New York from 1971-1982 and Rector at Christ Episcopal Church in Greenwich, Connecticut from 1982-1992. He retired to Omena and Ft. Myers, Florida in 1992. Jack was passionate in promoting interfaith dialogue, most importantly, his work with Rabbi Hillel Silverman of Temple Shalom in Greenwich, CT, which included authorship of The Jewish Christian Connection - An Interfaith Experience.

Jack married Jo-Ann Cox in 1952 in St. Louis, MO. They first came to Omena in 1957 staying in the Boswell sisters' cottage, which was a retreat for the clergy of the Diocese of Southern Ohio. Part of the deal for getting the house was that Jack would take Sunday morning services in George Smith's living room up on the hill during the two weeks they were there. Then in 1960 they bought land on Singing Sands, Jack sketched out his ideas for a house, and with a hand shake he and Albert Solem agreed to Albert building the Bishops a cottage. The price was set and Jack said he was hoping a fire place could be included for that money. Albert died the following spring, but not before he sent Jack a note saying he had gotten him a fireplace. The house, with later additions, lent itself well to entertaining and when Jack and Jo-Ann had their 50th anniversary, half of Omena came to the celebration.

Omena was their retreat and their great love. Jack delighted in creating contemplative garden spaces around the cottage using stones from Grand Traverse Bay. He also loved sailing and playing tennis with houseguests and their friends at OTYC and at Bill Ross's tennis court. He organized the annual tennis tournaments at the club and inspired many of us to participate. He and Judy Knorp won the tournament in 1997. At the cottage, Jack also constructed a labyrinth, a meditative tool, and many friends have

come to walk it.

He is survived by his devoted wife of 52 years, Jo-Ann, and four sons, John, Timothy, Matthew and Christopher.

Jack had written recently at the end of his memoir, "All things considered it has been a great and wonderful trip. Thanks be to God the Author and Giver of it all."

Jack was dearly loved by friends in Omena and all over the world. He and his world-class smile will be greatly missed.




