



### **Waterfront Report**




The waterfront assets of the OTYC remain in good and serviceable condition. These include the main dock, launch ramp and launch ramp dock. The main dock has been used by numerous members, as intended, and remains available to all members for short term use - subject, of course, to the low water table.

Members using the main dock facilities assume all risks and are asked to call either the Commodore or Waterfront Chairman to arrange for short term use. We also ask that all trailers be promptly removed to facilitate parking, boat launching, grass cutting, etc.

The sailing fleet now numbers 7 serviceable Sunfish, thanks largely to the repair efforts of the Youth Director, **Rich Connell**. We also disposed of a racing Laser this spring, and we thank the donors, **Glen and Delcie White** for accommodating that sale.

The Waterfront Committee again thanks the **Deibels** for making space available for winter storage of "ED", our classic power launch and special thanks to **Alan Reed** for his continuing work to keep Ed afloat and functioning.





### Three Cheers For the Youth Program

Tish registered all the campers daily and managed the program from July 3rd through August 11<sup>th</sup>, a big volunteer commitment.



# NEW OTYC MEMBERSHIP WAITING LIST POLICY

To implement the dual waiting lists established by the By-law changes adopted at this year's annual meeting, the OTYC Board has established the following guidelines:

- 1. The following will become effective January 15, 2007.
- 2. **OMENA BOUNDARIES** for the OTYC Membership waiting list referred to as "Waiting List 'A'" in the By-laws are:

Those residential properties located on either side of M-22 from Tatch Road to Northstar Drive; properties to the East of the centerline of M-22 (NWest Bay shore Drive) from the North side of Freeland Road on the southerly end to Cove Road, including North Cove Trail on the northerly end and including all properties on Omena Peninsula; and all properties fronting on the south sides and north sides of both Tatch and Craker Roads from the Village of Omena Westwardly to Overlook Road-EXCLUDING, HOWEVER, all properties which are or hereafter become:

Commercial

Condominium, Duplex, Time Share, non-family Fractional Ownership, or Similar Developments

Planned Site or Similar Developments

Properties which involve any element of "keyholing", such being defined as any project in which common waterfront access is provided to two or more property owners, their lessees or renters through a single or commonly owned waterfront lot.

3. JULY 1 "B" LIST ELIGIBILITY DATE

Those applicants on the "B" list will become eligible for guest membership only when there are no membership applicants on the "A" list as of July first each year. To be included on either "A" or "B" list, membership applications must have been posted on the Membership Bulletin Board at the club for two weeks and subsequently

have been approved by the Board of Directors as required by the By-laws.

### 4. CHANGES TO BOUNDARIES AND COLLATERAL RULES

Changes to the Omena Boundaries or collateral rules must have a vote of at least 5 members of the Board of Directors.

These changes must be communicated to the membership in the Breeze or at the annual meeting or by a general mailing and will take effect 30 days after the annual meeting or after the mailing has been sent.

#### NEW BOAT SLIP RENTAL POLICY

OTYC Slips Available- Club Rental Policy-- Four OTYC slips will be available for short-term rentals for the summer of 2007.

The outermost slip will accommodate a 25' boat, second in a 22' boat and the inner two next, shorter ski boats or whaler types of up to 20' with relatively shallow draft. The innermost slip is reserved for the club boat.

Rentals are available for a two-week period, at \$200 each. Rentals begin on Saturday at noon and end on the second Saturday following at 9:00a.m. Only club members may rent slips. Only one rental per membership per summer is permitted, and all rentals must be arranged in advance with the waterfront chairman. Payment in advance is required, as is a certificate of liability insurance naming OTYC as additional insured.

Rented slips will be marked as such and members are welcome to use those not rented on a first come, first served basis for a maximum of two nights. Extended stays, however, will not be permitted without a rental agreement.




The race field was reduced by a third when one competitor thought he did not have enough seasoned crew members to handle the boat under such conditions.

State of the Building Report for 2006/2007 by Jim Miller

#### General Information

Responsibility for the care and maintenance of the Omena Traverse Yacht Club Building is both important and rewarding. Its heritage goes back a long ways and because of its significance in our community, it deserves the best care and maintenance we can provide.

In the short time I have been in Omena, I have seen first-hand how busy this grand old building can be. Between the harshness of winter and the nearly daily use in summer, maintenance is an important issue. We must take good care of it so future generations can enjoy as we do today and others have before us.

Being the new kid on the block, I was lost when I was forced into asked to take on the responsibility of Chairman of the Building committee by the commodore, **Bill Knorp**. Were it not for all the support from many people, I would no doubt still be lost.

### **Overall Condition**

The building appears to be in fine shape, although there are some issues on the horizon. Those areas of concern are noted below.

#### Exterior

The building's paint is a mixed bag with southerly and westerly sides being in poorer condition. Those sides were touched up this year, as was needed to

remove peeled and cracked paint, dirt and other debris. For the most part, those areas were merely pressure washed and scraped where necessary in prep for painting. No real sanding was done. The end result was, in essence, a cosmetic touch-up.

The painter found areas where the wood has deteriorated and become spongy to the point that insects (wasps, bees, hornets, etc) can get through to the interior.

The roof over the upstairs balcony is sagging on three sides (north, west and south). Under close inspection, it appears the hip rafters were spliced (possibly due to a lack of long timbers or as a cost saving method), which has become a weak point over time. Snow loads may be part of the cause.

The splices are at various stages of separation. The east side of the roof was reinforced at some point several years ago and appears to be okay. That will be evaluated as well.

We have a new front porch floor! It was completely replaced and looks great. It may require one additional coat of sealer.


Attractive new roll-down sunshades were also installed on the west side of the front porch. They are very attractive and you can see through them. They also have a much better fastening system to keep them from blowing around in the wind.

### But Please Don't Blow the Roof Off

### Exterior Recommendations

Evaluate exterior paint and siding for possible repair/replacement next spring.

Contact a carpenter for possible solution(s) to sagging roof. As we all know, the replacement of siding can get expensive, so we need to consider that as a possible blip on the financial picture next year. We may be

#### Interior

As with the exterior, the interior seems to be in good shape with a few exceptions, none of which appears serious.

Additional shelves were needed in the kitchen. Two stainless steel shelves were provided and installed by **Tom Buehler**. I assisted with the install.

The middle set of overhead fans had a speed setting problem. They would not run at the middle speed setting, which is the most desirable. **Joe Pope** replaced the switch. New switches may have to be installed to permanently correct the problem.

You may have noticed that the ship's helm wheel lamp in the center of the room has been refurbished. **Tom Buehler** did a fine job in refurbishing it and in making sure all was operating properly.

The toys in the kid's game room need a little attention. Some are missing pieces or are broken. At the end of this season, I intend to take inventory of that whole area to see what is salvageable and what needs replacing or repair and get it done. If anyone has concerns or suggestions on this, please let me know.

Because of the siding issue on the exterior, there were a lot of bees and wasps inside the building when we opened it up this spring. They were especially evident in the upstairs children's play/game area.


We had Colliers do their annual spraying and that seemed to take care of the immediate problem. There were quite a few of the little critters inside (alive and dead)

before the windows were opened so there must be a number of ways for them to get in. Hopefully, the siding replacement will take care of that. We also found evidence of squirrels or chipmunks upstairs.

The restroom windows have an old coating on them that was supposed to keep people from looking in. They have outlived their usefulness and need to be replaced. I'll look into something more up to date.

### Interior Recommendations

Investigate and, if necessary, replace overhead fan switches. Clean up/organize children's game room area. Remove and replace bathroom window coatings.


### **Autumn in Omena - Nutty & Naughty**


The **Singers** have moved to Venice, Florida.


