

It vigorously debates issues and has both conscientiously and objectively moved the club forward in many ways.

There are also some intangibles that resonate with me, particularly the growing role our Legacy members are starting to play in supporting the heritage of the club and the values it has traditionally represented in the community.

As many of you are aware, I am a strong advocate of the proposition that the OTYC is a family and social organization dedicated to serving the social, recreational and educational needs of the Omena and Ingalls Bay area, as they are defined in our Bylaws. Simply put, I believe the character and use of the OTYC should be safeguarded. The place has had a special, definable character for over 60 years and that character must be maintained if our club is to retain that rare quality that we treasure. Seeing three and four generations enjoying being together and having cross-generational friendships lifts the heart. To me, this is the essence of the OTYC. The continuity of family friendships connected by a beloved summer place is rare indeed, and I feel fortunate to be part of it.

Before closing, I ask that you give particular attention to a local pest, Phragmites Australis. In this Breeze issue, we are foregoing our regular FAQ section to tell you a little about this very aggressive invasive species. Each of us should consider eradication of this problem in order to fully protect the environment of our beachfronts.

Minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Members of the Omena Traverse Yacht Club, July 19, 2008.

The annual meeting of the OTYC was held on July 19 and attended by 41 members. Commodore Buehler chaired the meeting and Dave Pohlod acted as secretary. Present Board members included Cmdr. Buehler, and board members Knorp (Rear Cmdr.), Harris, Oberndorf, Pohlod, Renz. Absent Brumbaugh and Edgley.

Minutes of the 2007 annual meeting were accepted and approved.

Cmdr. Buehler opened his remarks by requesting a moment of silence in memory of Glenn White and Dr. Panfilo DiLoreto, both of whom passed away during the past year.

Cmdr. Buehler then reflected on the major actions taken at the club during his 20 years of membership, including improvements made to the tennis court, porch, kitchen addition, roof, landscaping and waterfront. He noted that the club has become a special way of life for many generations of members and he planned to challenge Legacies to join the club as a way to perpetuate the club's long-range vision and values.

The following committee reports were presented to the membership:

Membership: Mrs. Harris representing Chair Kanda McKee reported that the number of regular and guest memberships reached a historic high of 281 in 2008, including 8 new full memberships. Cmdr. Buehler stated that the board determined that no new memberships would be made available for 2009, except for Legacies.

Youth: Tami Bosco represented Chair Karen Edgley and reported that, to date, weekly attendance has exceeded that of the last five years, with attendance for the week of July 14 at 29 (30 is the maximum allowable). Tami acknowledged the work of Rich Connell and John Varley, as well as the contributions made by Rich's wife Hannah to the overall success of the program.

It was mentioned that the sailboats are being abused by members and guests to the disadvantage of the participants in the youth program. A sixth week may be added to this year's youth program because of demand (week of Aug.11).

Social: Chair Charlotte Read recognized the efforts of members putting on the opening dinner, opening cocktail party, potlucks, catered dinners and special picnics and expressed appreciation for the new tables, chairs and tablecloths provided by the club this year.

Breeze: Chair Tish Renz acknowledged the help provided by the many *Breeze* contributors, and particularly the support provided by the Turners. Mrs. Renz indicated that the Breeze was published twice during the past twelve months, with income exceeding expenses during this period.

House: Chair Marsha
Buehler indicated the
Board had authorized a
number of improvements
including front porch seats,
roof repairs, repairs to the
concrete launch ramp,
pressure washing the
launch ramp and main
dock, a second coat of
front porch stain;
flagstone walkways, new
tables and chairs in the
clubhouse, a new kitchen

faucet set and filter for the bar were installed. The cost of these improvements totaled \$12,356.

At this time, the Board does not envision any further projects including improvements or changes to the capital assets of the club.

Grounds: Chair Bruce Balas recognized the good work being done by S&J Landscaping on the grounds. Mr. Balas also expressed his appreciation for the contributions made by member volunteers at the annual cleanup.

Waterfront: Chair John Mitchell reported on the repairs made to the launch ramp and to the metal chain at the ramp. He also indicated that the former club boat was replaced by a newer boat for a cost of \$1,400. The new boat named the "Alan Read" was christened at the opening dinner.

Treasurer: Commodore Buehler (acting for former treasurer Judy Balas) indicated that the present

checking balance was \$42,000, plus incrementally maturing current CDs of \$16,000, within which are retained earnings of \$5000; funds set aside for the Preservation Fund represented \$33,000.

Commodore Buehler indicated that based on the good overall financial health of the club, the board determined it would not be necessary to raise dues in 2009. The news was well-received by the membership.

Nominating: Chair Judy Pohlod read a resolution nominating Jeff Bosco to a new term on the board. Directors Tish Renz and Dave Pohlod were nominated to second three-year terms. A motion was made and seconded, and the members unanimously approved the recommendation of the Nominating Committee.

BOARD ACTIONS - FALL '08 by Tom Buehler

By email meeting earlier this fall, your Board adopted several actions. The Legacy recruitment effort will be continued for the summer of '09. (Recall, Legacies are automatically admitted and may elect to join at the present initiation fee of \$600, which may be paid in 6 annual \$100 installments along with dues).

The initiation fee for new applicants has been increased from \$850 to \$1,000 in recognition of the monies and efforts that have been invested in the club.

Our historic membership has been at 254. Present membership is 290. The Board determined that a target goal for future memberships should be 285, this being based on the capacity of the building and the number of guests we can accommodate.

Finally, your board voted to replace the existing flagpole. The new flagpole will be of the gaff rig type, suitable to the nautical character of the club.

Other Business: It was recommended that a no-smoking policy be adopted by the OTYC, covering the grounds, as well as the building (already a no-smoking area). Cmdr. Buehler indicated that the issue would be discussed at the next Board meeting.

At the conclusion of the meeting, several members initiated a discussion regarding the need to assist the GTYC in some manner given the fire that destroyed their clubhouse earlier in the year. While it was pointed out that the GTYC was well-insured, some members felt that an "outreach" to GTYC was required.

A discussion ensued regarding the need to support an event with the GTYC. It was pointed out that some members felt a public relations effort involving the GTYC was needed. It was noted that the board elected not to pursue a date for an event with the GTYC during the season. Concerns were expressed regarding the need to avoid commercial connections that were associated with the postponed event.

Comments were made regarding security concerns and the reservations about GTYC members getting benefits related to rental costs, in season use, etc., not available to OTYC members.

Several resolutions were put on the table. Ultimately, it was moved to form a committee made up of OTYC members to discuss ways to support the GTYC and to bring a proposal to the OTYC board for consideration. The motion was seconded and approved.

Meeting adjourned at 11:30. Secretary Dave Pohlod, 7/19/08


Commodore's Note






second cast (early Nov.) and still on crutches. Madison is the great-great grandson of early Omena resident, Dan Freeman Bradley.

PHRAGMITES AUSTRALIS by Tom Buehler

Many of you are aware of the phragmites infestation problem confronting waterfront owners. This non-native invasive reed is very damaging, both ecologically and to waterfront property use and values. Left untreated, phragmites forms dense stands 10-15 feet tall, and will within a few years time obscure beach access and views. In addition, it completely crowds out all other plant species.

Since it is non-native, it hosts no insects that native birds, frogs, and fish can eat. Its dense waterline growth destroys shore habitat and fish spawning grounds. This plant cannot be controlled by chopping it down — it grows back even more thickly, and spreads by seed, rhizome, and 60'runners. Its roots are very deep, and will send up new growth even if cut or burned. It can be controlled by a combination application of two herbicides, one of which is restricted and must be applied by a licensed applicator.

The application must occur between August and September to be effective. Because phragmites grow mostly below the ordinary high water mark, an MDEQ permit is required for treatment. A number of local groups will be joining together to apply for combined permits in the spring. If you google phragmites you will find information about the Beaver Island program. Also, see the columns by Kay Charter, Traverse City Record Eagle Sunday, November 2 page 7E. Excerpt below:

"This very tall, grassy-looking plant is reported to change both the structure and function of wetland ecosystems by altering nutrient cycles and hydrological processes. ... Now this awful vegetative menace has come to our special corner of the world. It has shown up along the big lakes, the bays, and even in inland areas. ...But here in the Grand Traverse area, the threat is not taken lightly.

"A broad coalition of governmental and nonprofit organizations is working on a plan of attack. A recent planning session was hosted by Michigan DNR. Participants included the Nature Conservancy, MDEQ, MUCC, local conservancies, and my own organization, Saving Birds Thru Habitat. The focus was to put together a spring event to educate the public about this plant and the threat it brings to our native flora and fauna."

Mary Louise Root, beloved wife of the late Harold Root, died on Tuesday, October 7, 2008. She was 100 years old. Mary Lou and Harold came to Omena in the 1960's and built their cottage on Ingalls Bay next to the Mack cottage. They enjoyed many summers there with their daughter, Phyllis Root Schneebeck, and grandchildren Julie and Tod. They were active members of the Yacht Club and took part in many OTYC events. She was Potluck Chairman several times. She was especially busy when Harold was Commodore in the 1970's.

Mary Lou was a primary teacher with the Cincinnati Public Schools for many years. She was also an accomplished pianist and, in addition, was a member of the College Club of Cincinnati and The Cincinnati Woman's Club. She loved Cocker Spaniel dogs and had many during her lifetime. 
Youth Program Attendance Soared in 2008

The OTYC 2008 Summer Program was very successful again this year with attendance increasing significantly from the 2006 and 2007 Summer Programs. The camper roster totaled 73 children, up from 58 children last year. There were no accidents or injuries other than minor first aids, band-aids, bee stings, etc. The staff was

essentially the same with Rich Connell as Director, with John Varley as the head instructor, Amanda and Taylor White, Shelbie Lingaur, Nina Lingaur, Carolyn Gulsby, Madison Duff, Clare Edgley, and Alex Edgley as Instructors. The last three volunteered their time, which was both beneficial and timely as the last week was the highest in attendance.

Activities were tracked on a daily basis and included: Sailing, Tennis. Swimming, Kayaking, Volleyball, Arts and Crafts, and learning knots related to boating. The daily activities recorded were tabulated, and the campers with the highest scores were selected as "Camper of the Week" on Friday. Campers were divided by age group nine years and under and ten years and up for activities such as Tennis and Sailing. Campers were encouraged to develop their sailing skills to the extent they were able to "Solo" on a Sunfish without help from the instructors. Several campers were able to accomplish this by the end of the summer. Additional instruction was provided through the Sailing Activity Books from U.S. Sailing as well as Boating Basics.

There were a few rainy mornings and these cleared up by noon, allowing the children to use the waterfront. A new boat, of the Boston Whaler style, was acquired by the club and made it much easier to be on the water to work with the children learning to sail. On one occasion it was necessary to rescue some campers from a capsized boat. The outboard engine started every time without fail.

A kayak was also purchased and it is recommended more be purchased. The children enjoyed kayaking a great deal and used the new kayak daily. The Bosco family brought their kayaks to camp on several days, sharing them with the other children, as did some of the other families.

There were no field trips this summer. With the increased attendance, the higher cost of gasoline, etc., it was decided it would be best to make Fridays "Fun Fridays" and pizza and other snacks were served to the children. Parents such as Tom Newland, Karen Edgley, and Tim White volunteered to come with various boats and take the children sailing and tubing on Fun

Fridays. We are grateful for their generosity in providing these additional activities for the children on Fridays. There are six Sunfish currently in sailing-ready shape with the newer rudder configuration.

There are two additional sunfish with the older style rudder configuration that is almost useless to use them. It is recommended these older hulls be converted to the newer rudder configuration as the

hulls and sails are in good condition and will serve the club for several more summers. Rich Connell is capable of doing this refit in addition to any hull repairs required next spring.

Fundraising projects included collecting cans and bottles for their deposit value, which offset expenditures for supplies. Tami Bosco organized a hot dog lunch on behalf of the Youth Program at the small boat race, which also resulted in a substantial contribution. Richard and Hannah Connell provided each camper a group photo taken on the front porch steps each week.

In conclusion, the past three summers have been a great success as the OTYC Summer Youth Program has grown and developed. I wish to thank the OTYC membership, especially the families involved in the Summer Youth Program for their support, encouragement, trust, and generosity, along with Commodore, Tom Buehler, the Board, and to Karen Edgley, Trish and Tami Bosco, for their commitment to the Youth Program.
