

Mary K. Woolford 1917 - 2011



Gilbert A. Deibel 1922-2011


Gil died at his home on Wednesday, July 20, 2011, surrounded by his caring family. Gil was born on February 18, 1922 in Saginaw to the late Ezra L. and Alma Deibel. After graduating from Arthur Hill High School in 1939, Gil started his academic career at the University of Michigan. His studies were interrupted when he answered the call of our nation and faithfully served in WWII. After returning from the war, he earned his BA in history from U of M in 1946 and his Juris Doctorate in 1949. For 41 years, he practiced law in the Saginaw area with the law firm of Cook, Nash and Deibel. On April 30, 1949, Gil married the former Annette Anderson in Bay City.

Gil was a founding Board member of the Big Brothers of Saginaw and served on the Board of Hospice of Saginaw, the OTYC, and Sharecare of Leelanau. He was also a member of the Saginaw Township Board of Education, the Saginaw



His interests included music, tennis, sailing, skiing, hunting, and a good debate. He is survived by his wife, Annette, his daughters Andrea (Michael) Muladore, Laura Deibel, and Roxanne (Charles Hodson) Deibel, and grandchildren Meagan and Erik Muladore, Katherine Fox, and Linnea and Evan Hodson.



Minutes OTYC Annual Meeting

July 16, 2011

The Annual Meeting of the Omena Traverse Yacht Club was held July 16, 2011.

Present: Tish Renz (Commodore); Jeff Bosco (Vice Commodore); Barb Harris (Rear Commodore); Dave Pohlod (Treasurer); Stuart Williams (Secretary); Caroline Oberndorf; Bill Cron

At 9:38 am Commodore Renz opened the meeting.

Commodore's Report:

Tish Renz welcomed the members, identified and thanked the board.

Stuart Williams stated that the 2010 Minutes of the Annual Meeting were posted on the website and printed in the December Breeze. Libby Mustaine motioned that the reading aloud of the minutes be waived, Bill Renz seconded. The motion was approved by the membership. Commodore Renz reported the building to be 100 years old this year.

Treasurer's Report:

Dave Pohlod reported that at the close of the 2010 fiscal year, the OTYC had a healthy balance sheet reflecting approximately \$59,000 in our checking account at Fifth Third Bank, versus \$41,000 for the 2009 fiscal year. Additionally, we have approximately \$18,000 in Certificates of Deposit. A portion of these assets reside in a previously established preservation fund (today amounting to about \$50,000) designed to meet future major club financial needs. From an operating standpoint, net income for 2010 amounted to approximately \$18,000 versus \$10,000 at the end of 2009. Bill Cron acknowledged that, as the building is 100 years old, it has some dock, window and septic issues related to age. He stated that the treasury is sound so fixing these problems should be achievable without raising funds. Dave thanked Judy Knorp for all the bookkeeping assistance she has provided.

Membership Report:

Commodore Renz read the membership report for the absent Martha Moffett, membership chair. The Club currently has 107 family memberships reflecting 214 people; 34 single memberships; 10 guest memberships of 19 members. Members Tom and Marsha Buehler and Joe and Betty Pope have resigned. We're sorry to report two deaths: Sam Cone and Conway Smith. Full time members joined in 2011: Bernie and Carol Gros, Ann Leathery, Tom and Debra Jeffrey. All total 298 persons.

Youth Program Report:

The Commodore reported that Jim Champion has returned as director of the Youth program. Amanda and Taylor White are the assistant directors. There were 3 kids pre-registered the first and second weeks, with 11 enrolled by the second week. There were 3 junior instructors the first week and one more added the second week. The big addition this year is the sailboats: A fabulous new fleet of six.

Social Committee:

Commodore Renz reported for the absent Barb Karchon. The social calendar was sent out in the spring Breeze and updates are being sent out in the weekly Scuttlebutt. Caryn and Bob DeVries and Georgie and Keith Disselkoen hosted a cocktail party on Memorial Day. The Opening Dinner was chaired by Mary and Bob Smart and Marcia and Michael Biskupski. Peggy prepared the barbecue menu. The Fourth of July was hosted at the OTYC thanks to Tami and Jeff Bosco and Lisa and Tommy Newland. Doni Lystra is doing an amazing job as the catered dinner chair this year. In June, Melissa Chenault hosted the first catered dinner with a nod to the British Royals prepared by Peggy. Sally and Brian Shapiro hosted next with Peggy doing the cooking assisted by Brian. There will be additional dinners on July 25, hosted by Jane Saxton and Stuart Williams catered by Trish Van Dusen, August 15 hosted by Kanda and Harold McKee and Deb and Les Disch catered by Peggy, August 29 hosted by Judy and Bruce Balas and Linda and Kim Kemper with Peggy preparing recipes from Turkey that they collected on their trip this winter. There is one after-season Catered Dinner planned for September 12 hosted by Judy and Bill Knorp. Potluck chair for July is Laura Deibel and Barb Harris is handling August. Building Report:

Bill Cron is looking into repair or replacement of the windows on the building. He stated that top priority will be given so that the architectural integrity of the building shall not be compromised.

Nominating:

Bob Gelakowski reported that Jeff Bosco, Cathy Stephenson, and Libby Mustaine had been nominated to fill the emptying spots on the board. Commodore Renz asked for nominations from the floor. As there were none Peggy Elscott moved that the slate be approved, Larry Reynolds seconded and the slate was elected by the membership.

Judy Pohlod offered thanks on behalf of the membership for all the hard work of the departing board members: Tish Renz as commodore for 2 years and Dave Pohlod as secretary for 2 years and then treasurer for 2 years.

Libby Mustaine moved that the meeting be adjourned, Peggy Elscott seconded and the meeting concluded at 10:12 am.




Bill Emmert with his medals from WWII and his flags.






