The social committee has worked over the year to put together a fun filled social calendar. A fashion show and a talent show have been added. And back by popular demand, is the family dance.







Stories from the Storm of March 2, 2012 Gathered by Debby Disch

The Record Eagle called it "the storm of the century" – we'll hope so. The snow started about 7 PM Friday evening, and everyone knew it was supposed to be a big one. But no one counted on the power being out, and especially not for four days! The snow came down wet and very heavy – 20 inches of it, snapping large boughs and bending and breaking whole trees, taking down power lines along with them. By around 1 AM Saturday morning, there was no power – anywhere. On Sunday, the Leelanau Township Emergency Services cleared 58 trees off of Omena Point Road, and that didn't count the trees already cleared by

some local heroes, the three trees across Omena Heights, or the many trees and limbs down across driveways.

Rink Smith was out as soon as the power went out, cutting fallen trees in order to check on neighbors, including Peg Deal, Charlotte Read, Be and Bill Fuertges, Dan and Liz Schleef, and Les and Debby Disch. The Fuertges were both down with serious bouts of flu, and thanks to his clearing, their daughter and son-in-law were able to get them out on Saturday and into a hotel in Traverse. By later in the day on Saturday, any hotels with power were full.

Bruce Balas and Tony Sova were out first thing Saturday, as well, chain saws in hand, clearing trees from neighbors' drives. Dave Dickerson was doing the same at his end of the Point Road. Thanks to all of their efforts, people were able to get out of their houses. By Sunday, more of the Traverse City hotels had power and vacancies. Everyone who was here for that storm has a story, and this captures only a few.

Charlotte Read had come from Virginia for a week to find some snow, but there hadn't been much during the week. She was scheduled to fly back to Virginia on Saturday, but couldn't leave until Sunday night. She was glad to find neighbors, Rink and Karon Smith on one side, and renters Chris and Heather Jacobs on the other side, who were very helpful. She had the best cross country ski ever on Omena Point Rd Sunday morning....until she met up with the snowplows! The Kennedys got her to the airport. This summer she will be replacing all the firewood! But she says she wouldn't have missed it for anything!

On Sunday, the Balases, Blounts, Kennedys, Alice Littlefield and Larry Reynolds decided to head for the warmth – and water – of a TC hotel. Remember that wells don't run without electricity! They all enjoyed each other's company at the Holiday Inn, which accepts pets. Another point of interest about the storm is that, when we checked into the Holiday Inn on Sunday night, aka Omena South, there were 150 dogs checked in. The staff had isolated the pets to a 4 story wing, with some exceptions. We never heard any barking in our hallway but when we walked to the elevators with Barkley, we could hear sniffing and snorting under all of the doors as we passed Bruce called it "living in a kennel." The landscape maintenance guy was really busy!

Melissa Chenault and Pumpkin also headed into Traverse, but stayed at a different hotel that took pets.

Bill and Lin Emmert were among those who toughed it out and stayed at home. They melted snow for water, cooked on the burners of our gas stove, and kept a fire going in the fireplace until they went to bed at night. They read and did puzzles, relying on flashlights and lots of candles as it got dark. They were unable to get off Omena Point Road until Sunday afternoon when the firefighters finally trudged in and cut up enough of the trees so that the plow could come through. Then Bruce Balas came over and sawed the tree hanging over their driveway, the Krists showed up to plow the end of the driveway, and Thad Smith used his Gator to plow the rest.

Up on Omena Heights, Les and Debby Disch were trapped until Wednesday morning due to downed power lines across the road. Like the Emmerts, they spent most of the daylight hours carrying wood to last through the night, and tending the fire. By Tuesday morning, they were running out of drinking water. They called the county, hoping that would expedite getting the hill cleared. But, no. Instead they contacted the township's emergency services — who arrived on snowmobiles with water, some groceries, and, much to their delight, four Barb's doughnuts!

Not everyone was out for four days. Most of Craker Road, including the Bensleys and the Smarts, had power by Sunday night. Like everywhere else, though, they lost tons of pine branches and a number of trees.*

Prospects dim for cherry harvest

"Oh, the weather outside is frightful" is usually associated with winter, but this year it applies to our Leelanau peninsula in the spring. Very unusual weather conditions have conspired to devastate the entire cherry crop. A two foot snow fall did physical damage to a large portion of the older trees. Later, a temperature swing of 80 degrees to 9 degrees over an approximate two week span completed nature's assault. The high temperature triggered early formation of the blossom stock, then the hard freeze inhibited formation of the pistil inside the blossom. No pistils, no cherries.

The Cherry Basket Neighbors orchard is young so it escaped damage from the snow. But, unfortunately, it has been affected by the freeze. Don Gregory, the orchard operator, said "Right now it appears there will be little or no tart cherry harvest this summer." This dire situation also occurred in 2002. Don feels sure these unusual weather patterns are due to climate change.

To make matters worse, this will be the third consecutive year for a smaller then average crop. The usual goal is to have about 18 months supply in reserve after the harvest is completed. This year there is currently less than one month reserve.

Sweets are also damaged, but it is too early to assess the extent.

So, the moral of this story is to suggest that you start rationing your cherry foods that were prepared last year.




