

Minutes OTYC Annual Meeting July 14, 2012

Board members present: Commodore Jeff Bosco, Caroline Oberndorf, Stuart Williams, Michael Ray, Nancy Cooper, Barb Harris, Bill Cron. Cathy Stephenson and Libby Mustaine were absent. Members present: 57

Jeff called the meeting to order at 10:10 AM and introduced the board members. Michael Ray counted 441 years collectively the board members have been coming to Omena. Tom Oehmke asked for and collected proxies. Jeff made some welcoming comments including: 49 people showed up for clean up in early June. New sailboats have all been donated at no cost to the club. New windows have been installed at little cost to the club because of Ed Oberndorf's fundraising efforts. New cabinets have been built and installed in the club. The club's interior, exterior and financials are all in good shape. Peggy Elscott moved to waive the reading of the minutes, Kathy Bosco seconded and the membership agreed.

Treasurer's report: Bill Cron submitted the financial statements from January thru December 2011. As of December 31, 2011 the club had approximately \$97,000. About \$40,000 has come from dues. Our major expense is the building and grounds and some programs.

Committee reports:

Social Committee: Linda Kemper announced that Tami & Trish Bosco are doing The Scuttlebutt. The African-themed opening dinner, 4th of July family picnic, and potlucks have been well-attended. Judy Balas announced 7 catered dinners for the season. Potluck programs will include fashion shows, Bingo, and The Neptune Quartet.

Youth Program: Trish Bosco announced a successful first two weeks of the youth program. Jim Champion has resigned and is no longer the director. We have great counselors for tennis and sailing. A new wider age group includes 6 yr olds to 15 yr olds. The standards for tennis and sailing have been raised this year. There are new organizational and operational goals in place.

Different themes and an increased variety of activities will be featured every week. Field trips outside of camp hours are being offered. There is increased advertising for camp including a facebook page. We have new manuals written by instructors for sailing and boating. We hired a tennis pro from the Leland Country Club. He is available twice a week for lessons. Jim Champion didn't feel he was able to hold up the new goals so he resigned. There will be Sailboat races with more serious instruction but still keeping a fun element. The qualifications of counselors include boater safety and lifesaving certificates.

Logo wear: Susie Goldman announced that the youth program often runs at a deficit so logo wear is sold to offset the cost. We are almost in profit mode thanks to all the sales this year.

Building Committee: Jim Miller and Bill Knorp selected contractors to look at the building, electrical, etc. Minor repairs have been made. New labels have been installed on the breaker box. The window project went very smoothly. We had a great contractor who did a turnkey project on time, then painters stained the interior wood on windows. Marcia Biskupski and Kathy Bosco have been at the club cleaning and washing and supervising a cleaning crew. The exterior has paint issues so Jim Miller suggested to repair paint as needed and then go around the building and do preventive maintenance every year by section. There are new storage cabinets in the kitchen. Kathy Bosco made new valances for the kitchen and upstairs and provided new cushions for the wicker furniture. A new cleaning crew was hired to do a better job keeping the kitchen clean. Tom Oehmke suggested Hardie plank siding to keep maintenance down on the exterior of the club. Jim Miller expressed his reasons not to have Hardie plank. The Board will discuss it. Old yacht club windows have been put to use at the Omena Historical Society Museum. Marcia Biskupski suggested the bar needs painting. Remaining old windows are for sale at the Omena Day sale in late July. All proceeds from the windows will come back to the yacht club. Jeff asked for volunteers to help sell remaining old windows.

Grounds Committee: Larry Reynolds, Bob Krist, Mike Biskupski. Larry began with a very humorous monologue. He reported the success of the clean-up day. The tennis court was cleaned and minor repairs were made. The drinking water was tested and was deemed safe. The launching dock was repaired by member volunteers. Trees and limbs had to be cut after a major snowstorm downed them on OTYC property. The sprinkler system was repaired this last week.

Waterfront Committee: John Mitchell recapped dock rebuilding by member volunteers. We have some reservations for slip rentals. There is a two-week limit. John suggests lowering the dock closer to the water level. It would be much more user-friendly if it were lower. Dennis Turner suggested docking the sunfishes to avoid damage to the new boats. The Board will discuss it.

The Breeze: Kerry Magrini encouraged the under-thirty set to contribute to The Breeze. She suggested articles about family history or club history to be submitted.

Membership Committee: Martha Moffett was absent so Jeff gave her report. OTYC consists of 115 family memberships, 34 single memberships, 2 guest memberships, 8 lifetime memberships, and 19 associate memberships for a total of 300 persons. We're sorry to report the death of 3 members: Mary Woolford, Gil Deibel, and Kay Harris. The Isphording, Bishop, Dickerson and Browning families have resigned. There is currently no long waiting list.

Nominating Committee: Suzie Mulligan, Joan Blount, Larry Bensley. Jeff asked Suzie to head the nominating committee. The committee's goal was to select persons who have love for the club and Omena, who could serve as commodore, etc. A new slate was posted at least 14 days prior to the meeting. The slate consists of Nancy Cooper and Stuart Williams, current members for a second term, and Mike Biskupski, new board member.

Election of new board members: Jeff asked for nominations from the floor. There were none. John Mitchell moved and Kathy Bosco seconded to elect the slate. All said aye, none opposed. Carolin Renz asked for the slate to be published in The Breeze in the future.

Bill McMenamy wanted clarification for posting nominees. Tom Oehmke clarified and assured that protocol was met this year as to posting nominees. Suzie Mulligan suggested making The Breeze included in the dues.

Drew Ehrhardt asked the Board to consider reducing or eliminating dues due to the sound financial shape of the club.

Jeff thanked outgoing board member Caroline Oberndorf for her commitment to OYTC for many years and how we will miss her good input and concern for the club.

John Smart purchased a new PA system for the club at his own expense. Jeff encouraged the membership to acknowledge him for that.

The Board offered a gift to Judy Knorp for her tireless bookkeeping on behalf of the club. Bill Knorp accepted on Judy's behalf.

Kim Kemper was asked to clarify what is going on with the Omena Post Office. Due to financial problems with the Post Office we have learned that the Omena Post Office will have a new plan to reduce the hours to keep it open with a new rural remote outpost status. Kim encouraged all year-round and seasonal residents to buy all their stamps for the year at the Omena Post Office.

Tom Oehmke counted and announced that there were 41 proxies.

William Marbach 1922-2012 Bill passed away on November 12 at the age of 90. Bill was a long-time Omena summer resident who contributed much to the area over the years. He began coming here in 1928 when he was six years old when his father, Reverend William Marbach, was the summer minister at the Omena Presbyterian Church and spent 37 summers at the manse. Bill married Carolyn Dickerson and they eventually built a cottage on Omena Point next to the Dickersons. He was an active member of OTYC and the Omena Historical Society, where he was instrumental in the founding of the society and contributed significantly to the OHS award winning "Omena, A Place in Time" by Amanda Holmes.

Bill was a WWII Army veteran, graduate of Lake Forest College and the University of Chicago Graduate School of Business. Furthermore, he was a charter member and

Elder of Elmhurst Presbyterian Church and an Elder at the Omena Presbyterian Church. His daughter, Margaret Buchholz, said that he always felt that Omena was the "most constant place in his life". His wife, Carolyn, and all three of his children, and their families; Bill and Deborah Marbach, Margaret and Al Buchholz; and Elizabeth and Doug Thompson gathered in Omena for a private family burial. There will be a memorial service next summer. Bill will be greatly missed by friends and family in Omena.



Hugh "Ole" Kiersey 1930-2012 Ole passed away peacefully at home in Durham, North Carolina on October 6, 2012. He is survived by his wife, Joan and his daughters Kathleen "Katja" Sage and Kim (James) Cleary. To those who knew him, Ole was a quiet hero who was caring and compassionate with everyone in his life. He enjoyed meeting new people and was keenly interested in their stories. He knew someone everywhere he went and always greeted them with a smile. For four years he honorably served in the United States Air Force. Ole loved woodworking, teaching and of course Omena where he spent his childhood and a lifetime of summers. We had a host of guests....Charlie, April, a friend of the family, Andy, two parakeets a Parrot (that did not shut up!) 2 guinea pigs, a large Husky dog and also Rob, who left Washington to escape the hurricane. It was indeed 5 days of togetherness!!!

Judy & Bruce Balas just returned from 3 weeks in Europe: one week in London going to the Theatre and seeing friends and two weeks in the old Yugoslavia. The later was breathtakingly beautiful and one of their best trips ever. It was all very Mediterranean but also

Italian (where the Venetians once conquered), Austrian (ditto) and Middle Eastern where the Ottomans/Turqs once made their home. They heard lots of fascinating history and many stories first hand. Their guide was a college student in Sarajevo when the war started in 1991. She said they had no heat, no windows which had been shattered by

exploding bombs, no power and limited food which was mostly bread and rice. To have wood for cooking, they burned the trees in their yard and neighborhood and eventually their furniture. Water was not available in their homes so someone had to risk being shot by a sniper to collect water many blocks away. A year after the war began, her father - a pediatrician - was killed. She and her mother fled to Croatia, risking their lives to escape. A year or so later the daughter, our guide, was sent to Rome to live with family which she told us "saved her life." After the war ended in 1995 and she had finished college, she returned to Sarajevo with her

mother to reclaim their home, or what was left of it. She and her family live there now.

Judy & Bruce visited a fjord in Montenegro, the only one in the Mediterranean, spent several days in Dubrovnik and Split, Croatia. They took a day trip to Mostar, Bosnia, significant because a bridge in 1993, which connected the Muslim quarter to the rest of Mostar, was bombed and destroyed by the Serbs. This served as a metaphor for the "ethnic cleansing" demanded by the Serbs. Buildings were generally repaired but often a single wall was left which was filled with bullet and shrapnel holes. In the town was a sign carved in stone which read, "Never forget 1993." Other very beautiful sites visited were the Plitvice Falls, a series of 16 cascading lakes which formed indescribable waterfalls. They also visited the Julian Alps in Italy and walked through a WW I bunker while trying to imagine how difficult it was for our troops to survive in these wet, cold and cramped conditions and a very difficult, steep terrain. The road that they traveled through the Alps was built by Russian prisoners. If you ever get the chance, this is an area of the world that is well worth the visit.

Hope everyone had a Happy Thanksgiving and that you are looking forward to a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.








Team McTrivia is already at work this fall, hoping to accumulate enough for another "cruise" in 2013.










