



Sally & Brian Shapiro went with the Indianapolis Jewish Federation last October for a mission trip to Cuba. Visiting the four Synagogues and a Jewish Community Center mostly in Havana, we pooled together dozens of suitcases full of necessities for them. Adult and children's socks, underwear, clothing as well as much needed over the counter pharmaceuticals, our donations were greatly needed. Not only does their government supplied income not make it to the end of each month but there are no stores and nothing for them to buy, even if they had money. Simple bottles of Advil are impossible to find except through the generosity of tourists. Prior to the fall of Cuba in 1959 there were tens of thousands of Jews in Cuba; now there are fewer than 900.

The step back in time is amazing but what is most shocking is the decay and decrepit state of most of the buildings and homes. Culture is rich and Old Havana is gorgeous as are most of the Embassies. That is where most of the current photos are taken. But I cannot image there is enough money or investors to repair 80 years of storm damage, neglect and squalor that rules Havana. This is beyond a fresh coat of paint - but there is so much beauty remaining to see why my father in law would travel there so frequently in the mid 50's. It must have been splendid.

If given the opportunity to go, you should. Take donations with you ("Gifts" are taxed, donations are not). Be aware that 70% of the people on our trip ended up with "travellers illnesses". You cannot drink from the tap but we all drank Cuba Libre like we were at the Knot Bar! Hmmm - maybe that was their problem!


