#### Commodore's Letter

Greetings OTYC Members -

It seems hard to believe we are quickly approaching another fun filled season at the OTYC. As I write this letter news from Omena is that a foot of snow fell the first week of April! Members in Omena said it's beautiful to see but they are hoping warmer spring weather is coming soon!

Thanks to the generous contributions of many members the tennis court will be resurfaced and new fencing will be installed around it by the second week of June. Our fund raising goal of \$18,000 has been met and, as a result, our tennis court and newly striped pickleball courts will be in great shape for use this season by members and Youth Camp attendees. Thanks so much to all of you who contributed to this project.

Last year's winter storm damage that made our boat launch ramp unsafe for member use has been repaired and is ready to be used this spring. Jim Morrison, our Waterfront Chairperson, can answer any questions about the ramp including the combination to the lock on the chain if you have forgotten it!

On a less positive note, this winter, ice on the bay pushed two anchor poles upward approximately two feet out of the water on two of our permanent docks. Since the structural integrity of those docks has been compromised, the poles will have to be vibrated back into the ground. This work is scheduled to be completed by May 1st. It is anticipated the docks will be ready for use the beginning of the season.

Many wonderful activities are planned for the 2018 season thanks to the volunteer effort of our Club chairs. Breeze editor Trish Bosco and Membership Chair Bill Renz work throughout the year collecting information and presenting prospective new members. The Nominating Committee Chair, Suzy Wheeler led efforts to recruit new Board member candidates and summer committee leaders Mary Tonneberger (Scuttlebutt), Susie Goldman and Julie DeWitt (Logowear), and Housekeeping (vacant) keep us informed, stylish, and clean throughout our busy season. Dennis Armbruster, our Building Chair, will have things inside and out in tip top shape. 

Dennis Turner has finished his first book, What Did You Do in the War, Sister? How Nuns in Belgium Defied and Deceived the Nazis in World War Two.

The book is about Sister Christina, an Ohio farm girl. who joined the Sisters of Our Lady of Namur to teach English and agricultural skills to young Catholic girls, but instead she found herself trapped in Nazioccupied Belgium for the duration of World War Two. She and other Sisters of Our Lady in the Saint-Hubert Convent quickly learned that living their normal contemplative, disciplined lives was impossible in a country controlled by ruthless Nazis. Soon they were risking their lives by joining forces with the Belgian Resistance to hide refugees, Jews, and downed American pilots. Sister Christina believed her ordeal was over in September of 1944 when American troops liberated Saint-Hubert. That hope was crushed when Saint-Hubert was recaptured by the German army during the Battle of the Bulge; forcing the Sisters to revert to their tactics for survival and resistance until liberated for the second time.

This book is a fictional memoir based on actual events. The inspiration for the book came from hundreds of letters and other accounts written by Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur who were living in German-occupied Belgium and Italy during World War Two.

Pickleball was invented in 1965 on Bainbridge Island, a short ferry ride from Seattle, Washington. Three dads — Joel Pritchard, Bill Bell, and Barney McCallum — whose kids were bored with their usual summertime activities — are credited with creating the game. Pickleball has evolved from original handmade equipment and simple rules into a popular sport throughout the US and Canada. The game is growing internationally as well, with many European and Asian countries adding courts.

Pickleball has a very interesting name, especially since no pickles are used. It has controversy as well! Accounts of how the name originated differ. 1. According to Joel Pritchard's wife (Joan), she started calling the game pickleball because "the combination of different sports reminded me of the pickle boat in crew where oarsmen were chosen from the leftovers of other boats." 2. According to Barney McCallum, the game was officially named after the Pritchard's dog Pickles, who would chase the ball and run off with it. Graf, M.D., his sister, Janet G. Tate, and his grandson, William Graf Thayer. Dr. Graf was educated in Cincinnati at University School (K-12), University of Cincinnati (B.A.), and University of Cincinnati College of Medicine (M.D.). After serving two years in the Army, he received his obstetrical training at Cincinnati General Hospital and his training in gynecology at the Passavant Memorial Hospital in Chicago (Northwestern University). He returned to Cincinnati after his training, and for many years worked in partnership with Dr. James McCord. His primary allegiance through his years of practice was to Bethesda Hospital where his grandfather, father, and brother also practiced medicine. From 1959 to 1974, he served as Chairman of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at Bethesda and, during those same years, directed the Residency Training Program. After he retired from the clinical practice of medicine, Dr. Graf served as Bethesda's Director of Medical Education for twelve years. In his retirement letter to his patients, he told them it had been an honor to serve as their doctor, and then he added: "I can only hope that somehow you sense my abiding appreciation of what I consider a sacred trust existing between us."
